ASTONISHING STATISTICS IN A. A. U. REPORT.

New York, Nov. 19.—There are some astonishing statistics in the report of the registration committee of the Amateur Athletic union of the United States which has just been holding its annual convention here. These figures show the enormous growth of athletics in America. According to the report no less than 2,415,515 persons were engaged during the year in athletics of some form or other, and this was exceeded in the following: swimming, bowlers, basket ball players, baseball players and gymnasts. A valuation of the properties owned by clubs whose members take an active interest in track and field sports amounted to \$24,259,189.
