HOPE TO ESCAPE ENGLAND.

Think They Have Borne Sersecution Long Enough, and Ask Protection of the Stars and Stripes.

[Early Dispatches.] New York, May 15 .- According to the Pretoria correspondent of the Herald the commission composed of Messrs Fischer, Wessels and Wolmarens, and representing the republics of the Transyaal and Orange Free State, which is expected to arrive here today, is empowered to take Important action. The correspondent says:

"I have the highest authority for making the statement that, rather than see their country conquered by Eng-land, the commissioners are empowered to ask the United States to assume a protectorate over the republics, this protectorate to tend, if desired, toward ventual annoxation as Territories or States.

Secretary of State Reltz, who is rapidly breaking down under the strain he is undergoing, voiced this national hope in these words: We will main-tain our independence if we can. If we cannot we will appeal to the American people to take us under their wing. Surely the Declaration of Independence is broad enough to span the occan. Our last hope is that having again and again carried our burden of persecution into the wilderness to escape from Eng-land, we may be permitted to deposit it at the foot of the statue of Liberty, to find peace and protection under the Stars and Stripes.""

## Him to Go to Italy.

#### London, May 15 .- The Express of today advocates the ostracism of Richard Croker in England in revenge for Tammany's attitude on the Boer war. It

"It has not escaped notice in this country that an American welcome to the Boer delegates has been inspired and encouraged by Tammany Hall, which is controlled by the notorious boss, Richard Croker.

"The records of Tammany are al-readly black enough without the addition of this new infamy. But what makes the action of Tammany peculiarmakes the action of Tammany peculiar-ly infamous now is the fact that Croker claims the hospitality of an English domicile, poses as an English country-gentleman, and runs race horses on the English turf, yet is alding and encour-aging the worst of England's enemies. "Croker's position is practically on all fours with that of the duke of Or-leans, except that, perhaps, he does not carry that taint of personal un-cleanliness which made his highness of Orieans unfit to associate with his re-Orienns unfit to associate with his re-spectable fellow creatures. The duke has already paid the penalty of having fallen under this ban of social ostra-

cism 'Croker is having excellent reasons for not spending more of his time in America than be can help. He has bought Moat House, Wantage. His claims upon our hospitality have al-ready been fully recognized, for he is

admitted to various sporting clubs of more or less importance. He now ap-parently desires to qualify as an English land owner by encouraging the voters whom he controls in New York to express sympathy with men who are engaed in shooting the sons and broth-ers of other English land owners.

"This may be American politics, but it may be doubted whether it will com-mend itself to the members of those clubs which Croker has hitherto fre-quented or Englishmen who live in the listrict where he bought himself

"If Croker finds that the bracing all of the United States does not invari-ably suit his constitution he should secure the calm seclusion of an Italian villa within reach of the duke of Orwhose company he will probably find congenial."

That the moral effect of artillery far exceeds the practical results has been temonstrated over and over again in the present war. After firing so many rounds the side, these firing have been convinced that so many hundreds of the enemy have been rendered hors du combat that they have promptly ac-cused the enemy of concealing casunt-ties, when the published results dis-agreed with expectations. When the war commenced, the burghers had war commenced, the burghers had acard so much about the terrible effects of lyddite that it was with fear and trembling that they faced the first fighting. They learned, however, that the ordinary British field battery does not fire lyddite, and that on soft ground lyddite is comparatively harmless. For any one with weak knees the whistling of the lyddite shell and the crash as it explodes are calculated to have a depressing, if not a demoralizing effect; but the licer is the most phicgmatic of men, and he has no nerves.
