INQUIRY INTO THE M'MAHON SUICIDE

Victim Blames a Commercial Street Woman for Rash Act.

DIVORCE DAY IN COURT.

Four Unhappy Wives Freed From Gulling Bonds of Mismated

Ogden, Dec. 18 .- A coroner's inquest over the remains of Henry T. McMahon, who committed suicide Thursday night at the Boulanger lodging house on Twenty-fifth street, was held yesterday afternoon at Larkin & Sons' undertaking parlors, before Judge John D. Murphy and a jury composed of T. W. Jones, William Moyes and James McBeth,

The first witness examined was Mrs. S. E. Sillsby, proprietress of the rooming house, who testified that the dead man and his brother hired the room Thursday morning, that the two spent the day together, and at about 11 o'clock at night she heard a gun shot, but thought it was outside in the alley. She went to sleep and was awakened by Charles McMahon, brother of the dead man, about 1 o'clock in the morn-immediately dressed and notified the police, who soon responded.

Sergeant Pincock and Officer Rackham testified to answering the call, that when they arrived at the room they found Henry T. McMahon dead with a hole in his head and the pistol was lying on the dresser. They found two letters in the room written by deceased just before he committed the rash act, one to the I. O. O. F. directing that they take charge of his remains and have them shipped to Ontario, Oregon, to the lodge there for burial, and that all of his effects be given his prother, who had come to Ogden with to a Salt Lake paper, telling of his association with a Commercial street oman, and setting forth that she was all to blame for the act he was about to

Charles McMahon, brother of the dead man, testified to coming to Og-den with his brother Thursday from Elko, Nevada, and to his entering their room about 1 a. m., when he found his brother dead. He could give ending his life, but always carried a

condition in which he found the body The jury after heaving the testimony rought in a verdict that he came to his death by a gun shot wound inflict ed by his own hand with sulcidal in-

The remains were at noon today shipped to Ontario, Oregon, for burial. Mr. McMahon was 57 years of age and quite well preserved for his age.

Ogden, Nov. 18,-Judge Howell, broke the divorce record of the Second district court yesterday by hearing and dispasing of four divorce suits yester-

The suit of Jennie Browning against Walter Browning was called for trial, The prosecution gave testimony showing that the couple were married at Ogden Nov. 13, 1897; that defendant is an habitual drunkard and has failed to provide his family with the necessares of life and has deserted his wife and little children. A decree of divorce was granted, and custody of two minor children was awarded to the mother.

Frieda D. Haines was granted a decree of divorce from Harry B. Haines on the grounds of non-support. She was also given the household goods and \$1,000 to be derived from a piece of land to be sold at Winona, Wisconsin, at which place they were married Oct.

Miss Jennie Walker was given an ab-solute divorce from Owen Walker, also custody of their minor child, a 13-year-old girl. The grounds on which the decree was entered was failure to provide. They were married in Canada, April,


