The amendment is not the same as asked for by Snow and Darst, but is a substitute amendment proposed by Councilman Ferry, at the caucus, and instead of allowing a straight increase of 10 cents per thousand in the rates to be charged consumers, it provides for a sliding scale of rates, according to the quantity of gas used by the consumer.

MEETS SOME OPPOSITION.

In the caucus yesterday afternoon, Mulvey and O'Donnell opposed the amendment as asked for by the peti-tioners, whereupon Ferry submitted the sliding scale amendment, which met with the approval of all. It was accordingly agreed to nut the amendmet with the approval of all. It was accordingly agreed to put the amend-ment through last evening. When the matter of franchises was reached by the council, Ferry moved that the gas franchise be taken out of the hands of the special committee, and disposed of by the council. The motion carried, and the amendment, which follows in part, was then placed on its first, sec-ond and third readings:

THE AMENDMENT READ.

Section 2. In consideration of the granting of this franchise the said grantees agree as follows, to wit: That the rates to be charged consum-

That the rates to be charged consum-ers for gas furnished by them for the first twenty-five years from and after Nov. 1, 1906, shall not exceed the foi-lowing schedule of prices: Gas for fuel purposes only shall be furnished at not to exceed the follow-ing rates: For the first 2,000 cubic feet per month to any one consumer through any one meter, \$1 per thousand cubic feet; for the next 20,000 cubic feet or any portion thereof, furnished during the same month, to the same consumthe same month, to the same consum-er through the same meter, 90 cents per thousand cubic feet; for all gas fur-nished in excess of 22,000 cubic feet during the same month, to the same

consumer through the same meter, 80 cents per thousand cubic feet. Gas for illuminating purposes only shall be furnished at not to exceed the following rates: For the first 2,000 cubic feet furnished

to any one consumer through any one meter, in any one month, \$1.40 per thousand cubic feet; for all gas in ex-cess of 2,000 cubic feet furnished to the same consumer in any one month

same consumer in any one month through the same meter, 31.30 per thousand cubic feet. For the remainder of the life of said franchise there shall be a deduction of 10 cents per thousand cubic feet from each and every of the foregoing prices. There shall be a deduction during both of said periods and from all of the prices herein provided for of 10 cents

There is also a provision which will permit the city to purchase the plant when completed, if the company desires to sell. to sell.

FERNSTROM AGAINST IT.

After the amendment was placed on After the amendment was placed on its third reading Fernstrom made an argument against it. He contended that the substitute amendment was not as good a proposition for the city as the first amendment. The sliding scale. the urged, was an injustice to the small consumer, and gave the company more than it asked for as far as the small consumer was concerned. Another point which did not look good to him, point which did not look good to him, was the conflict between the rates fixed for the full life of the franchise, and the clause in the original franchise which allowed the council to regulate the charge for the gas in the future. He argued that the amendment would do every with the arbitration of rates do away with the arbitration of rates as provided in the original franchise. WELLS OF SAME OPINION.

Wells was of the same opinion on that the amendment was to a particular sec-tion of the franchise and that it did not affect any other section in the original franchise at all and hence the arbitration clause was not disturbed

arbitration clause was not disturbed in the least. The roll was then called on the pass-age of the amendment and it resulted as follows: Ayes-Black, Carter, Crab-tree, Ferry, Hobday, Martin, Mulvey, O'Donnel, Wells and Davis; Nays-Barnes, Fernstrom and Tuddenham. The rates in the original franchise were \$1.35 per thousand for illuminating gas and 85 cents per thousand for fuel gas.
