DROWNING FIRE IN A SHIP.

Savannah, Ga., Sept. 26.—The steam-ship Nacoochee, of the Ocean Steam-ship company, lies at her dock with her forward hold full of water that was pumped in to it by twenty lines of hose to drown a fire that had started in the cotton stowed there the cotton stowed there.

The vessel, commanded by Capt. Howlett, was to have salled at 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon for Boston. At 4 o'clock smoke was seen issuing from the forward hatch and fire was discovered among 700 bales stowed in the hold.

The alarm was sounded and the dock crew, the vessel's crew, the city department and several tugs began directing streams into the hold. The hold will be pumped out and the Nacoochee may sail tonight. It is not believed she was damaged.

# INTOXICATING BEVERAGES.

Very Great Reduction in Production In July and August.

Chicago, Sept. 26 .- According to fi-Chicago, Sept. 25.—According to h-gures given out last night, by Charles R. Jones, national chairman of the Prohibition party, there was an as-tounding decrease in the production and sale of intoxicating beverages in the United States during the months of University and Jagest

of July and August last. Nearly \$1,000,000 a day was the de-crease in liquor production, as esti-mated by the Prohibition leader. The greater decrease, according to Mr. Jones, was beer production, and this in face of the fact that July and August are said to be the two months of the year, during which beer is most

heavily consumed Mr. Jones says he bases his statement on official figures received from the internal revenue department at Washington.

Two Trains Collide in Berlin, Result ing in Death of Eighteen Peo.

ple, Many Severely Injured.

Berlin, Sept. 26-Two trains on the Berlin elevated railroad were in collision early this afternoon. As a result

18 persons are dead, eight seriously and many others slightly injured. Most of the deaths resulted from con-tact with the electric rails. This assident was caused by a mis-

placed signal. One of the cars which was crowded with passengers was was crowded with passengers was thrown into the street forty feet below and shattered. The greatest mortality was in this car

The police were quickly at the scen and the work of extricating the dead and wounded was begun. Ambulances were summoned and waited close to the scene of the wreck while the in-jured were brought out. Then each wagon with its suffering passengers

hastened to a hospital. The collision occured in the heart of what is known as the "triangle," a notable piece of railroad construction where doubled tracks cross. A model of this crossing was exhi-

bited at the St. Louis exposition. Among the dead is Richard Wendt, an architect.
