The General Lord Methuen is recovering rapidly from the serious wound he sustained. It has been arranged at military headquarters that the unfortunate general will not be retained in an administrative capacity in South Africa.

Six thousand British yeomanry and large forces of cavalry and infantry are preparing to sail for South Africa immediately. The British government is determined to retrieve the severe blow to British military pride inflicted by Delarey, even if it takes the last red coat in England to subdue the plucky Boers. According to the latest plans of the war office, Klitchener is to abandon the major part of the administrative work in South Africa and personally conduct a movement to carture De Wet, in the first place and afterwards the other big Boer leaders.
