

## BIKE RACES ON SAUCER TONIGHT

Rain Last Evening Caused Postponement of Good Events.

### STEVENS-HOPPER CONTEST.

Jack Christie and Jerry McCarthy  
Stout at Salt Lake Athletic Club  
This Evening.

Manager Scheff is having his share of trouble in trying to pull off bicycle races at the saucer track these days—or rather nights. The weather man seems to have let up on the balmy breeze and turned his attention to the bike riders with the purpose in view of causing disappointment in large chunks to hover around the saucer.

A splendid program of match and sprint races had been made up for the entertainment of the cycle fans last night, but just before the shades of evening fell, something else fell. The something else was about seven million tubs of water. The track was soaked and the races were called off. Manager Scheff at once announced that the program would be pulled off this evening. He did not say if it is a defiant spirit, but in all meekness, and in the hope that the weather man would not "bait" him again.

Besides sprint races for amateurs and professionals, there is to be a three-mile match race between Orlando Stevens and N. C. Hopper that is sure to please the crowd. These riders are considered the fastest men on the track and as both are in fine shape, they may be counted upon to put up the race of their lives.

### PROPOSED FOOTBALL GAME.

U. of C. Team May Play Denver University Eleven Here.

The Denver university football team will play the University of Utah team in this city on Oct. 31. All preliminary arrangements have been made for the meeting of the teams and a contract has been signed by Director Harvey Holmes, on behalf of the local team, and forwarded to Denver calling for two games, one here this fall and the other in Denver a year later. The contract will be signed by representatives of the Denver team and returned here.

Negotiations are also on with the Agricultural college for two games this season with the University team. These are the two strongest schools in the state and it is thought that they should meet twice each season on the gridiron. Should such arrangements be made, one of the games will be played here and one at Logan.

### BIKE RIDERS SCHEME.

Talking of Organizing Insurance Company for Speeders.

A scheme to organize an accident insurance company for the benefit of the riders on the saucer track, has been advanced by Orlando Stevens, one of the best riders and it certainly should meet with favor among the boys. The idea is to tax the riders twenty per cent of their earnings and get the management of the track to give one per cent of the rate receipts and thus create a fund for the benefit of those who are injured while riding on the track. There have never been any very serious accidents as yet, but one is liable to happen at any time. In case of injury a rider could draw on the fund until he is able to ride again.

Both men are trained to the very minute and will be in shape to give the very best there is in them. In betting circles Christie is slightly the favorite. They are to weigh in at 155 pounds, and both declared today that they were now under weight. In coming down to the notch they are evenly matched and from a pugilistic standpoint the bout will probably be one of the best ever seen at the club.

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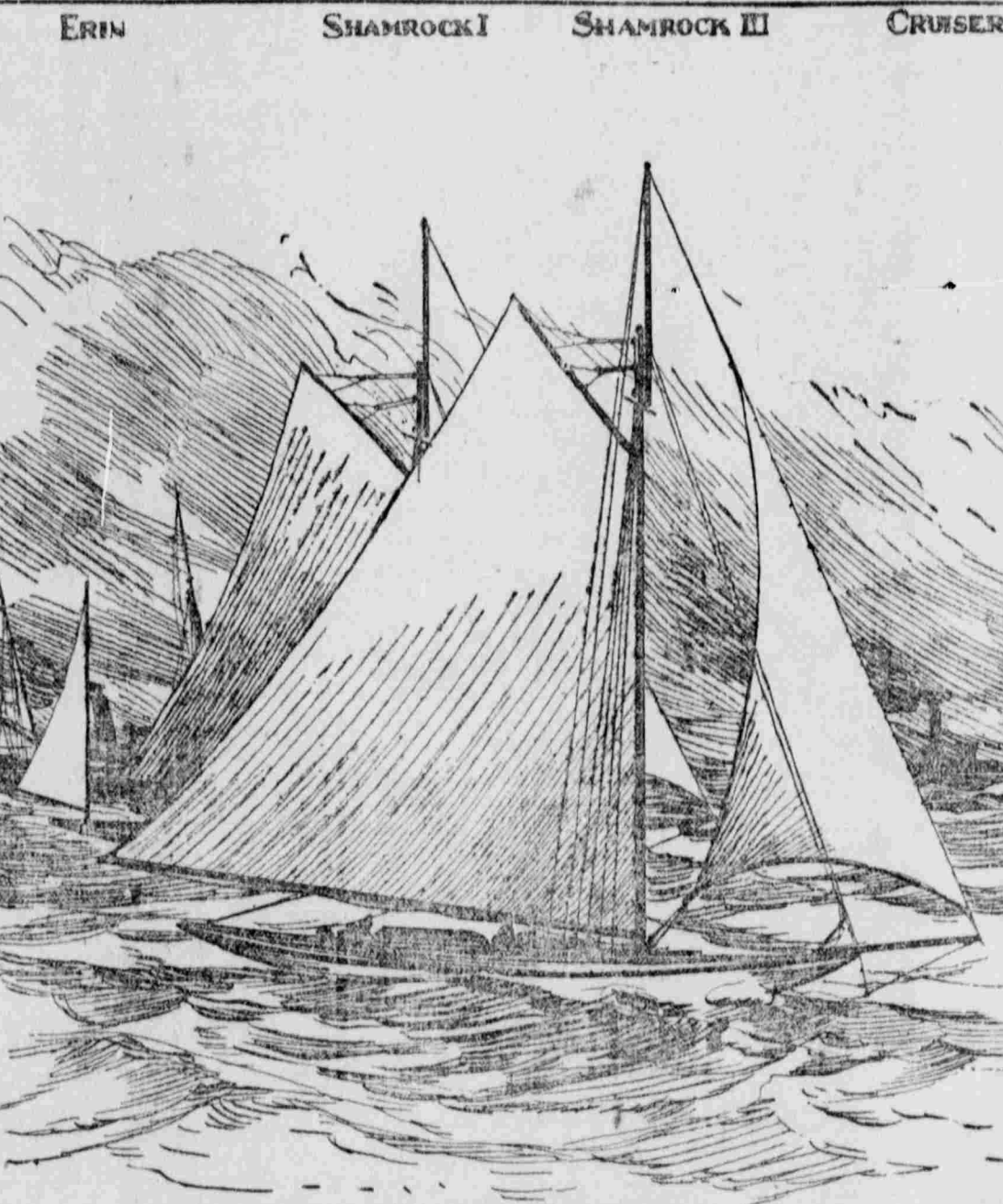

SIR THOMAS LIPTON'S RECORD BREAKING CUP HUNTING FLEET.

A decade or two ago when yachts from abroad came over on cup hunting bent their sole motive power was furnished by their own sails and their only consorts were the sky and the water and a few sea birds. Now the cup challenger is towed much of the way and besides has a veritable fleet of vessels as a convoy. The illustration shows the challenger, Shamrock III, accompanied by Shamrock I, Sir Thomas' yacht Erin and the ocean going tug Cruiser, comprising the Lipton squadron, now on its way to New York.

#### Fog Butts In.

New York, June 9.—Fog today again prevented a race between the three rivals for selection as cup defender. The start was set for 11 a. m. but at that hour a thick fog overhung Sandy Hook, where they lay. It was clear within the hour when, at 1 p. m., the Constitution left the starting line. The Reliance and Columbia followed half an hour later, all three yachts in tow. Carrying only main-sails and club topsails in a 15-knot wind they sailed too fast for their tags to keep ahead of them and had to ease off their spinnakers to keep their towlines taut.

The Reliance and Columbia were two miles from the starting line when the fog shut down, and they returned to the fleet followed later by the Constitution. The fog then lifted in the lower bay but was still thick over the race course. The yachts will race tomorrow, weather permitting.

#### Corbett at Quarters.

Oakland, Cal., June 9.—James J. Corbett arrived here today and at once proceeded to the cottage at Croft's garden, which is to be his training quarters. He will begin active training on Saturday.

#### Gus Lawson Won.

Worcester, Mass., June 9.—In the opening meeting of the paced circuit Gus Lawson of Salt Lake defeated Caldwell of Manchester, N. H., and Will Simon of Cambridge tonight. The stakes were for a 2-mile race, but Lawson refused to go on the track together and five-mile heats were raced. Lawson beat Simon in the Caldwell motor went wrong in the final and he was beaten by a lap and a half by Lawson in 1:29.

**ROSTER FOR CONFEDERATES.**

Gen. Gordon Thanks Secy. Root for Urging Congress to Authorize One.

Washington, June 9.—After the close of the Confederate reunion at New Orleans there was an exchange of letters between Gen. John B. Gordon, president of the Confederate Veterans' association, and Secy. Root. Gen. Gordon wrote:

"My Dear Secretary—Please accept from me and the United Confederate Veterans, whom I represent, the assurance of our sincere appreciation of your generous course in urging the provision for a roster of all ex-Confederates, as well as of ex-Union soldiers. The readiness of all Confederates to co-operate with you was also fully expressed."

Secy. Root, under date of June 6, replied as follows:

"My Dear Gen. Gordon—I thank you for your kind letter of May 23, advising me of the gratifying way in which the Confederate veterans look upon my course in regard to the publication of a roster of ex-Confederates and ex-Union soldiers. I beg you to believe that I fully appreciate and highly prize this expression. I think next to the splendid fighting which was done on both sides in the Civil war, the re-establishment of friendly relations and common sympathies between the two sections which fought the lifetime of the very men who fought so desperately against each other is a high title to respect for Americans by the world."

**NAVAL ORDERS REVOKED.**

American Warships Will Not Now Go To Valparaiso.

Washington, June 9.—The orders issued yesterday for American ships to go to Valparaiso have been revoked, owing to receipt of a cablegram from Minister Wilson which indicates that their presence is not needed.

The explanation given at the department for the sudden change of plans, in substance, that the department for some time past had been receiving advice from various sources indicating the existence of a serious situation in Chilean waters, owing to a formidable strike of dock laborers and severe rioting and destruction of property. The navy department was advised of this situation and an intimation was given that the presence of American warships at the scene of trouble would be prudent.

When the department decided to send the South Atlantic squadron from Montevideo the emergency had ceased to exist. Minister Wilson, by cable, reported that the Chilean government had the situation well in hand. This was received after the orders had gone to the South Atlantic squadron, so it was necessary to cancel them, which Secy. Moody did today.

**Epplinger & Co's Creditors.**

San Francisco, June 9.—The committee appointed by the creditors of Epplinger & Co., the grain dealers, to investigate the affairs of the firm met today. After considerable discussion three attorneys were chosen to institute insolvency proceedings in the United States courts. Representatives of Epplinger & Co. consented to the plan and admitted their insolvency. This action was prompted by the fact that three of the banks concerned have already obtained writs of relief for the grain stored at Fort Costa, and are now in virtual possession. Other creditors took exception to this and it was agreed that the interests of all the creditors could be best protected by regular insolvency proceedings.

**Pope Receives Pilgrims.**

Rome, June 9.—The pope today received 300 pilgrims, who are returning to their homes from the Holy Land. They were most of the French. The audience lasted 20 minutes. Only a dozen leaders of the pilgrimage were permitted to kiss the hand of the pope, who addressed a few words to them and gave the apostolic benediction to all. The pontiff urged the French pilgrims to "pray fervently for dear France, which needs it so much."

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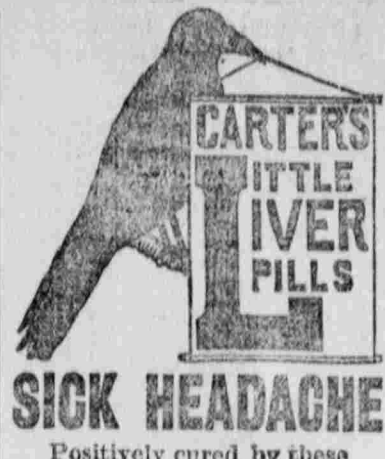
