## REGISTRATION IS HEAVY IN OGDEN

Over 2,000 New Names Added—  
Both Big Parties  
Confident.

### MOVEMENT FOR GOOD ROADS.

Ogden Waves Preliminary Hearing—  
Rev. O. A. Elmquist Goes to  
Iowa—Weddings.

Ogden, Oct. 30.—In most of the elections in Ogden yesterday considerable interest was shown in the registration of voters, and some hard work was done by the candidates on the three tickets, and the party workers. It is believed by those most interested in the election that there will be more votes polled on election day this year in Ogden than there has been for a number of years. The registration of voters yesterday was unusually large, while the exact number of persons registered could not be obtained. The estimate is that over 2,000 people were registered, which is about one-third of the entire vote of Ogden city.

Chairman Hanulski of the Republican central committee, was pleased last evening with the outcome, for he candidate on his ticket on election day. Said he: "Some good work has been done this year in interesting the people in election. I had out over 80 workers and 40 carriages, and the prospects for a Republican victory are favorable. The principal thing discussed and looked upon with favor was the proposal to issue \$1,000 bonds to build good roads throughout Ogden, and all present were named as a committee to use their influence with the next legislators to have a bill passed providing for the issuing throughout the state of bonds for the building of good roads.

A general of the gentlemen present expressed satisfaction in seeing a rock crusher used to prepare rock for the county road and approved of the method being pursued by Sheriff Sebring and the county commissioners in putting the county jail prisoners at work improving the county roads.

#### CALIFORNIA WAIVES HEARING.

Charles H. Calland, the Oregon Short Line claim agent, who is charged with wrongdoing to the railroad company, has waived preliminary hearing. In default of \$2,500 bonds he was remanded to the custody of Sheriff Sebring until his case comes up for final disposition in the district court, as it is understood that Calland intends pleading guilty to the charge when the trial comes to the higher court.

It was believed at one time that his friends were going to try and raise the amount he took from the railroad company and pay it back, and then endeavor to have the case dismissed against him, but it is doubtful if such arrangements could be made if the money could have been got on Wednesday.



Moving Crop of Sugar Beets at Rate of

600 Tons a Day.
