THE CITY ATTORNEY'S OPINION.

He Quotes a Long List of Authori-
ties.

When the original proposition was
made by Mr. Bacon in October last to
the City Council, to lease the Old Fort
Square, for a term of years for a rail-
way depot, the matter was referred to
the Board of Public Works, consisting of
Steens, James, Parsons, and C. C. Colan.
The question arose as to whether
the city could legally lease the
property. A committee was ap-
pointed by Mr. Parsons, asking him to give
an opinion on the subject. It is
presented below in full:
