HIGHWAY ROBBERY TRIAL.

Miss Peterson Meets With Painful
Accident—Wife Beater Goes
To Jail.

Ogden, Utah, Nov. 8.—The Holland choir which was organized in Ogden, May 21, 1906, through the efforts of Leo van den Akker, held its first banquet last evening at the Fifth ward amusement hall, and was attended by over 100 guests. The banquet tables were spread in the main hall of the building and were laden with the bounties of the land. During the serving of the banquet an orchestra consisting of Peter Noorda, B. van der Schuit, Albert Bell, John Krullboeck, Arnold Linburg and Bishop John Wais, G. H. Denkers were performing. ACQUITTED BY JURY.

The trial of Robert Armstrong, charged with robbery, was commenced yesterday afternoon before Judge Howell and a jury. An Italian, about 25 years of age named Gravano Dominec, was the principal witness. He testified to having seen the defendant at Croydon, Morgan county where he was employed on the new cement plant, that he boarded a freight train to come to Ogden, and the defendant and two companions got in the same car and while enroute, the trio, he claimed, at the point of a gun held him up and took \$34.65 from him and then pushed him from the train.

STORY DISCREDITED.

The defendant was able to prove his good character and the apparent weakness of Dominec's testimony and the jury after being out a couple of hours returned a verdict of not guilty, and the court ordered the release of defendant. His two companions are in custody awaiting trial on the same charge, a separate trial having been asked by each of the men, which was granted.

YOUNG LADY HURT.

Miss Matilda Peterson, primary supervisor of the Weber county public schools, is confined to her home suffering from a badly crushed foot. Miss Peterson was out election day to one

of the county precincts visiting the school, having along a horse and buggy. When she had finished her inspection of the school, she went out to untie the horse, when it jumped and stepped on her foot, badly crushing the toes. She came to her home in Ogden and summoned a physician, who dressed the injury, but it will be some time before she can resume her work.

LOOKS BLACK FOR BROWN.

Charles Brown, the wife beater, will not be able to get off so easily this time, as Detective Pender has sworn to a complaint charging him with assault with a deadly weapon, on which charge he was arraigned before Judge Murphy, and his bond fixed at \$1,000, in default of which he was turned over to the custody of Sheriff Sebring. The date of hearing was not set. Mrs. Brown will testify against her husband, setting forth that he came to her apartments last week and threatened her life with a pistol.

BEECH WAS ABUSIVE.

Suit for divorce has been filed in the district court by Annie Beech against Ernest Beech. The complaint sets forth that the couple was married in this city June 28, 1906, and that within a week after said marriage defendant began to curse and abuse plaintiff, and has failed to provide her with the necessities of life; that plaintiff has been compelled to seek protection from his abuse by going to the home of her mother to live. She asks for a decree of divorce, the restoration of her maiden name, Annie Hogan, and such other relief as the court may decree just.

CHALLENGER OUSTED.

Only One Democrat Was Elected in Oxford.

Oxford, Idaho, Nov. 7.—The election here yesterday was not without incident. One Mr. Gumpert was present at the opening of the polls, and challenged every vote, with one or two exceptions, and caused a little flutter at the first. The judges at once decided that where the name was properly registered the person was entitled to vote. The challenge was made under article 6, section 2 of the constitution of the state of Idaho. All went quietly until about 3 o'clock, when Mr. William Scott, being challenged, demanded that the challenger be removed from the room, an officer then led him out of the house and he went at once to the station and took train for Pocatello. All was quiet from then till the close of the polls.

The election went almost entirely Republican as out of a total of about 140 votes, most of the Republican candidates received from 120 to 130 votes. An exception was made, however, in the case of James S. Campbell, Democratic candidate for assessor and collector of Bannock county, who received 87 votes against 55 for L. B. Case, Republican.
