Belden, a broker, and brother of Henry Belden. who has been conspicuous for years in endeavoring to form a company to sup-

His application sets forth that the company has suspended business for want of funds. The appli-cation was made to Vice Chancello, Emery, who has fixed the hearing for Tuesday of next week.
