### VICTIM OF DIPHTHERIA.

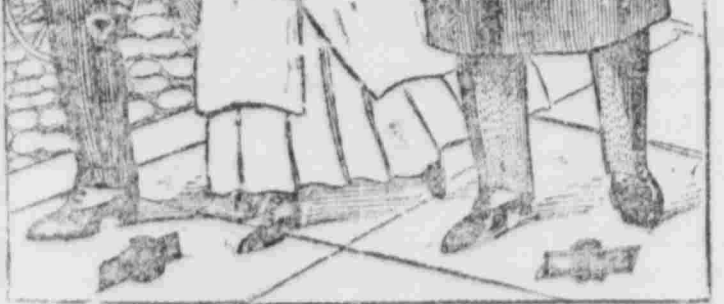
The 4-year-old child of Mr. and Mrs.

#### DEATH OF PHILIP W. BAKER.

Beaver Branch B. Y. University Begins  
Winter Course.

Beaver City, Nov. 23.—After a number  
of years of severe and painful affliction,  
caused by stomach trouble, Elder Philip

having been successively ordained

tery, from a deacon to a high priest,  
and established a good record in each  
quorum.

#### BLEEDING DISEASE.

Peculiar Affliction Carries off Daugh-  
ter of Mr. and Mrs. Hallidraake.

American Fork, Nov. 26.—Edith Hol-  
lidraake, the 15-year-old daughter of  
Mr. and Mrs. John Hollidraake, died  
this morning of a very peculiar dis-  
ease, called the bleeding disease. She  
was attacked with it gradually bleed-  
ing to death, as no cure has as yet been  
found.

In the present case the little girl be-  
gan bleeding at the gums, which was  
thought to be due to an ulcerated tooth.  
A dentist was consulted and he recog-  
nized the dreaded disease, but refused  
to extract any teeth, as that would only  
hasten the fatal result. She was then  
placed in the care of Dr. J. F. Noyes of  
this city, who called in Dr. H. E. Rob-  
bison for consultation, and they were  
successful in stopping the flow from  
the child's gums. But as soon as this  
was done the flow commenced from  
the nose. This continued for about 10  
days when the child finally died from  
loss of blood.

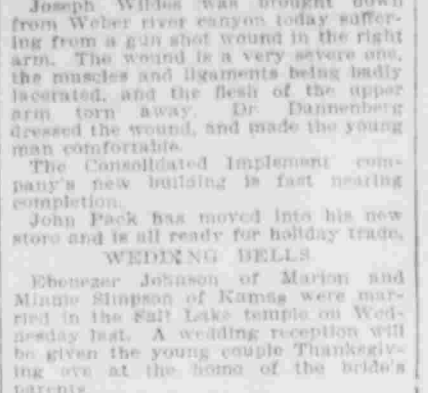
#### Farewell Missionary Social—New Bell For Schoolhouse.
