LOCAL BRIEFS.

Mrs. James Hogg has presented a handsome green silk altar cover to St. Mark's cathedral.

The recent holiday sale held by ladies of St. Mark's Guild netted \$250 for the church cedar fund.

The annual ball of the Utah Federation of Labor will be held at Labor hall on the night of Feb. 22, and special pains will be taken to make of this a record affair.

The pupils at Rowland Hall have contributed over \$53 toward the Bishop Leonard Memorial fund, which, with other contributions, brings the total up to \$247.

Adjutant-General Bowman has qualified and been sworn in, and is now in the saddle. Brigadier-General S. C. Park will qualify the first of the week, and appoint his staff.

Government mail now will leave Bridgeport, Utah, for Ladore, Colo., Sundays at 1 p.m. and Mondays at 6:40 a.m., arriving Sundays at 6:40 p.m. and Mondays by 12 m.

There is a great deal of activity in interior construction at the new Y. M. C. A. building, and the great central stairway is being rapidly set up. The swimming pool is well along in building.

The regular monthly meeting of the Veteran Volunteer Firemen's association will be held next Monday evening, Jan. 9, at 7:30 p.m. in the Canyon road hall. Old firemen are invited to attend.

Elder Anton L. Skranchy, who has just returned from the Scandinavian mission, over which he has presided for over three years, will address the Scandinavian meeting in the Assembly Hall tomorrow at 10 a.m.

The second dance of the University club winter series will be given at the club house on the evening of the 13th inst. On account of limited room, invitations are restricted to club members and holders of visitors' cards.

The Thursday evening ladies' nights at the Elks club are proving a gratifying success. The function of last evening, was attended by nearly 100 people, and the club house was a scene of social animation until late hour.

The legislative committee of the Utah Federation of Labor decided last evening to work for the passage through the coming Legislature of an initiative and referendum law, and a law requiring the periodic inspection of all boilers.

Roger Powers, son of the judge, has taken first, second and third prizes on pigeons, first on pen, second on cockerel, and a number of special prizes, at the Ogden Poultry Show. He will send chickens to the Richfield and Salt Lake exhibitions.

A. D. Blair, the old tailor of the Constitution block, died yesterday afternoon from asthma, at the age of 74. He had been a resident here for the past 14 years. The funeral will be held at 3 p.m. tomorrow from the chapel of J. W. Taylor on West Temple street.

The First Presbyterians have raised the necessary money to resume building operations, and Contractor Campbell begins the first of the week completing the great Sunday school room. In the rear part of the structure, when that is done, work on the main part of the edifice will be taken up.

The remains of the late Brigadier-General William H. Penrose were disinterred yesterday afternoon by Undertaker O'Donnell at the Fort Douglas cemetery and shipped to Washington, D. C., for final interment in Arlington cemetery, and Captain G. H. Penrose of the quartermaster's department at Fort Townsend, Wash., has gone east to conduct the interment.

Councilman Barnes received a letter this morning, from shepherds in the Jubb desert, stating that with the exception of one small flock, the Jubb desert, there had been no precipitation for a long time, and all of the western deserts are practically bare of snow. In view of this, shepherds are very fearful about venturing out, for with their sheep, and there is a feeling of uncertainty as to the winter's outcome for grazing that is embarrassing.

The two year old grandson of Senator W. A. Clark of Montana, better known as "The Million Dollar Baby," was in town yesterday afternoon for a short time, chaperoned by his aunt, Mrs. G. A. Launder and Miss McLennan of Butte, en route to Los Angeles. The child's mother died about a year ago, and she has been entirely cared for by relatives. His grandfather wrote a million-dollar check for the young man shortly after the mother's death.

City Recorder Critchlow and his deputies got busy yesterday morning, and granary, at a cost of nearly \$2,000, improvement is a great convenience to the quartermaster. Utah will not be represented by troops at President Roosevelt's inaugural review. A letter has been received by Gov. Cutler from Gen. G. H. Harries, who has charge of the military arrangements for the parade, asking whether or not the state will send troops. Gov. Cutler has replied that on account of the great distance Utah will not send troops. The governor will have personal representation at the inauguration, but who will receive that commission is not known at present, although it is believed that Adj't.-Gen. J. M. Boxman will be chosen.
