

CITY COUNCIL NIGHT.

Felland's Proposition For a West Side Sewerage System.

THE CUREN VETO SUSTAINED.

The Sanitary Inspector Writes of the Necessity for Building Another Crematory.—Municipalities.

The City Council met in regular session last night. President Lockwood presided. The members in attendance were: Rich, Felland, Hardy, Kerk, Moran, Horn, Kelly, Evans, Bennett, Wadsworth and Lawrence. Absent—Hendrick, Helm. After the usual preliminary matters had been disposed of, business was transacted as given below.

THE PROSECUTION.
A. Hendrick and others asked for an extension of watermain on Third South street from Fourth East to Ninth East street. Referred to the city engineer.

A. R. Nesbit asked for the construction of a sewer on G street. Referred to the city engineer.

George Forester asked permission to lay a private watermain on his premises. Committee on waterworks.

J. D. McAllister and others asked that a certain irrigation ditch be filled up. Referred to the street superintendent and waterworks.

Doyle & Wolf asked permission to move a house from its site on Liberty Park. Referred to the city engineer.

Martin Prosser asked that the city engineer be instructed to make a survey of his property. Filed.

F. W. Madson asked permission to pile building material in front of his property. Committee on waterworks.

Toddman and Stein made a similar request. Same reference.

The Salt Lake Rapid Transit company stated that they were not certain that they could continue to furnish power for the sewer pump at Fifth South street and Jordan river after May 1st and asked that the proposition for same be submitted. Committee on waterworks.

O. W. Worthington et al asked for a sidewalk concrete extension on the east side of Seventh East street, between Fourth and Fifth South streets. Referred to the city engineer.

F. Auerbach & Co. et al asked that Hugh Terry be appointed special policeman without pay on the Walker House block. Granted.

William Young asked for a fee license to exhibit amusements views. Denied.

John Miller Jr. et al asked that George Hilton be appointed night watchman on the Opera House block. Committee on police.

Richard Brimley and others asked for an extension of watermain on Eighth South street between Second and Third West streets. Committee on waterworks.

Henry Siegel et al asked that a sewer district be established to extend on the north side of Second South street from Second East to Second West streets. Committee on sewers.

L. D. Kinney asked permission to construct a bridge across the Jordan river in Kinney's Canyon. Filed.

William Mangrove asked to be appointed special policeman for Franklin avenue without pay. Committee on police.

J. E. Lawrence et al asked that the rock pavements on West Temple street, between South Temple and Fourth South streets, be at least twelve feet in width. Board of public works.

J. E. Jensen sent in a communication stating that the building of the new across City creek between Canyon road bridge and the mouth of the new aqueduct would endanger his property, and petitioned for relief. Referred to the city engineer.

Sam J. Kenyon et al asked that notice of intention for the grading and construction of a sidewalk on Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh South streets, between Ninth East street and the military reservation, and on Tenth, Eleventh, Twelfth and Thirteenth East streets, between Fourth and Seventh South streets. Referred to the city engineer for introduction.

J. E. Butler et al protested against the extension of sewers between Fourth and Fifth East streets, on Second South. The protest being sufficient to defeat the extension, the matter now being published was ordered discontinued.

TO SEWER THE WEST SIDE.
Felland offered the following which was referred to the city attorney.

Whereas, A large portion of Salt Lake City lay in the west is destitute of sewerage facilities, therefore be it

Resolved, That the street committee and the city engineer present a feasible plan to sewer the same at an early date.

SEWER BY THE MAYOR.
The Council sustained the Mayor's veto of the curfew ordinance on a vote of 7 to 6.

ON PAY DAY.
The city paymaster suggested that the heads of the different departments be instructed to allow the men by quit work at four o'clock on pay days in order that they may be paid off by six o'clock. Committee on finance.

TO SEWER THE DIVISION.
City Treasurer Davis reported that A. H. Cannon et al had advanced money for water main extension on Eighth West, between Ninth and Tenth South streets, and suggested that the difference between the amount of their tax and the total amount advanced be returned to them. Referred to a more specific statement.

BELOW TO THE CITY.
The city treasurer submitted abstract of the total of bonds 177, 178, 179 and 180, paid to Salt Lake City survey, showing that the total of the property in the city and that the persons who have been transferring same have no right to do so. He also recommended that the tax sale against the said property be renewed, and that the same question be referred to water main extension now amounts to \$2535.00. Committee on public grounds and city attorney.

FROM THE BOARD OF PUBLIC WORKS.
The board of public works reported that they had ordered a sidewalk on Main, First and Second South and West Temple streets to furnish flagstones for two crosswalks in each block, to be made of flagstone or other material, and that the same be laid only over the stone portion of the street.

The board recommended that the petition of J. E. Taylor et al, asking permission to lay certain sidewalks on Second South street near East Temple street, be not granted, unless petitioners agree to lay a sidewalk.

Also, that the petition of Willard Young, asking permission to lay a flagstone sidewalk on South Temple street, be granted.

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C. Carter for permission to lay a 12-inch water pipe from the terminus of the main on South Temple street between Eighth and Ninth East streets to his residence on the corner of Ninth East, be granted subject to the pleasure of the council under the usual conditions. The council refused to adopt the report.

The committee on waterworks recommended that the petition of H. W. Lawrence et al for the extension of water main on Ninth East street from Fifth South street to Tenth South street be granted subject to the pleasure of the council under the usual conditions. The council refused to adopt the report.

SEWER MATTERS.
The superintendent of sewers submitted the report of the sewer extension work, as follows:

Kerkick offered the following resolution which was referred to the committee on sewerage:

Whereas, A sewer line of 10 per foot has been authorized, the sewer extension on both sides of Fifth South street from Second East street to Fifth East street, and

The sewer construction has cost only \$10.00 per foot, but, be it

Resolved, That a rebate of \$1.00 per foot be so immediately made to the whittling property holders within the above sewer district.

WATER MAIN EXTENSION.
The committee on waterworks recommended that the petition of H. W. Lawrence et al for the extension of water main on Ninth East street from Fifth South street to Tenth South street be granted subject to the pleasure of the council under the usual conditions. The council refused to adopt the report.

THE FIRST ALCOHOL.
The committee on license reported to the council of the petition of D. C. Kerkick for a license to operate a saloon on Fifth South street, between Second East street and Third East street. Adopted.

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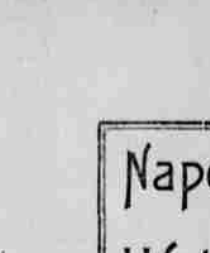
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
