





Denver, Feb. 23 .- Father Leo Heinrichs was shot and killed when administering the sacrament at carly mass in St. Elizabeth's Catholic church Eleventh and Curtis street, this city, 6 o'clock this morning. Kneeling at the altar rail, between two women, Guarnaccia pressed the muzzle of the revolver against the body of the priest, after receiving from him the consecrated water and shot the man of God through the heart. Exclaiming, "My

through the heart. Exclaiming, "My God, my God," Father Leo fell prone in front of the attar and died without uttering another word. With an inarticulate scream of tri-umph, which the communicants des-cribe as the yell of a demon, the as-massin sprang into the adde, and, wav-ing the smoking gan about his head, dashed to the church door. The the sinoing gats above his head dashed to the church door. For a moment the hundred or more people in the church were dazed. Then women shrieked and the congregation became panic-stricken. Some women fainted and many became hysterical. Several men rushed to the ald of the priest and others started in pursuit of the murderer. Among the latter was Patrolman Daniel Crefin, who overtook the fleeing Italian on the church steps. Guiseppe attempted to shoot the police-man and was folled and overpowered only after a desperate fight, in which several men had come to the assist-ance of the officer.

#### MOB SOUGHT ASSASSIN.

MOB SOUCHT ASSASSIN. The murderer was hurriedly removed to the city jail, and as threats of sum-mary justice were made by many men in the crowd which quickly gathered in front of the church. Chief of Police Michael Delaney called out the reserve force of patrolmen, who were kept on guard day and night. Before the commotion caused by the tragedy had subsided, the Franciscan Brothers connected with St. Elizabeth's church silently brought candles for the

Brothers connected with St. Elizabeth's church silently brought candles for the dead and placed them beside the body of their superior where he lay. By di-rection of Bishop Matz, the church was closed for the day, and the following notice was posted on the door: "Owing to the frightful tragedy en-acted in this church by an unknown criminal, the wanton killing of our be-loved pastor, superior and friend, Fa-ther Leo, all services will be discon-tinued for the day. Kindly, reader, breathe a silent prayer for the repose of the soul of our beloved friend. "FATHER EUSEBIUS." Deputy Coroner Daniel Hayes took

A single hole in the white communion robes of the priest showed that the built had gone straight to his heart. The bullets remaining in the revolver had been sharpened to a fine point.

GUARNACCIA'S STATEMENT. Guarnacsia was placed in solitary con-finement at the city jail. He admitted to a policeman who interviewed him that the priest whom he had killed was a stranger to him, and in explanation of his crime made the following state-

"I just went over there because I have a grudge against all priests in general. They are al against the workscheral. They are all against the work-ingman. I went to the communion rall because I could get a better shot. I did not give a damn whether he was a German priest or any other kind of a priest. They are all in the same class."



against the murderer of Father Leo had been made, there was considerable talk around town throughout the day of the justice of lynching him. In or-der to avoid an attack on the city jail, Guarnaccia was taken to the coun-ty jail, a more easily guarded build-ing, where he remained several hours. Some groups of men becau to congre-Some groups of men began to congre-gate near the county jall, and after a consultation the authorities decided to take Guaraccia out of town. Ac-cordingly he was hustled into an auto-mobile and a fast run made to Little-ton 14 miles from Denues, schare, a train

contingly ne was nucled into an anto-mobile and a fast run made to Little-ton, 14 miles from Denver, where a train was boarded for Colorado Springs. Tonight Father Eusebins, senior as-sistant pastor to Father Leo, received a telegram from the father provincial at Paterson, N. J., requesting that the body of the murdered priest be shipped there for interment. This will be done, and in order that the body may arrive there no later than next Sunday, funeral services will be held here on Wednesday morning. Though the custom of the Franciscan order permits of no eulogy of the dead at funeral services of members, this rule will not be followed in the case of Father Leo, because of the tragic na-ture of his death. Rev. Father Wil-liam O'Ryan of St. Leo's church will deliver the eulogy over the remains of deliver the eulogy over the remains of Father Leo, and at the same time will preach a sermon on anarchy and so-cialism. In all likelihood Father Eu-sebius will conduct the funeral cere-monies. The funeral will be attended by the entire body of Knights of St. John, Knights of Columbus and other Catholic orders. Catholic orders.

#### WANTED TO KILL FOUR.

An examination of letters taken from An examination of letters taken from Guarnaccia showed that the only defi-nite address he appeared to have was No. 10 Wallese place, Wakefield, Mass. Guarnaccia told Chief of Police Dela-ney, Sheriff Nisbet and several detec-tives, who questioned him, that he started out this morning with the in-tention of killing four priests. Had he succeeded in chuding canture he says succeeded in eluding capture, he says, he would have gone from one church to another until his vow had been carried out. Guarnaccia displayed no re-morse for his crime and reiterated his previous statement that he believed he was benefiting the poor people by tak-ing the life of the priest. He said that the church kept the people poor while the priests lived on the fat of the land

the land. Among the papers taken from the as-sassin was a list of assassinations, from the murder of Czar Paul of Russia in 1801 to the killing of the king of Por-tugal within the last month. A minia-ture Italian flag, pasted at the head of the list, Guarnacclo declared had no significance whatever. No notes or comment of any kind were inscribed or attached to the list. The prisoner was closely questioned concerning his resi-dence at Paterson, N. J., but nothing important was learned. He declared that he knew nothing of Father Leo when the latter lived at Paterson, and, in fact, had never seen or heard of him before today. Guarnaccia admitted that he had been in Chicago, St. Louis and other eastern citles, but disclaimed Among the papers taken from the asand other eastern cities, but disclaimed any knowledge or connection with an-archists in any of those cities.

"I left Italy three months ago, went first to Central America and then came to the United States and to Denver. I am an anarchist and I am proud of it. I shot him and my only regret is that I could not have shot the whole bunch of priests in the church. I am a shoemaker but have not worked since

bunch of priests in the church. I am a shoemaker, but have not worked since coming to Denver." Pather Leo Henriechs was born at Roein, Germany, Aug. 15, 1867. He en-tered the Franciscan order Dec. 4, 1886, and was ordained July 26, 1891. He came to Denver last September from Paterson, N. J., where for three years he was rector at St. Bonaventure's. He had previously served three years in Croghan, N. Y., where he distin-guished himself by rebuilding the church, monastery and other buildings that were destroyed by fre in 1992. He that were destroyed by fire in 1902. He was planning to sail for Germany in June and visit relatives, whom he had not seen for 16 years.

### WOMAN ACCUSES HUSBAND OF MURDERING BROTHER

Portsmouth, N. H., Feb. 23.—As a result of an accusation made by Mrs. Paul L. Roy, known in operatic circles as Glacia Calla, that her brother, George A. Carkins, was killed by her husband at her home in Newington, Jan. 2, the county officials decided to-day to hold an autopsy on Carkin's body next Tuesday. When Carkin's died the medical examiner, decided that his death was due to suicide by shooting.

After the tragedy Mrs. Roy left for New York with her husband, but last week returned to Portsmouth, where she told the authorities that follow-ing a family dispute her husband and brother became engaged in a pistol duel, during which Carkins received a fatal wound in the head. Since her statement officers have examined the kitchen where the shooting occurred, and have found several builet marks on the walls.
