Ten Men Connected With the Exploitation of the Famous Lost **Bullion Spanish Mines.**

MINE SAID TO BE AN OLD CAVE

So Government Officials Declare-Indicted Men Say Cattle Co. is Behind the Prosecution.

Denver, Colo., April 9 .-- Ten men who have been connected with the exploiting of the Lost Bullion Spanish Mines company, which claims to own a fabulously rich mine near Silver City, N. M., were arrested today by federal officers on indictments returned by the federal grand jury in session at Fueblo last week. Two indictments were returned against each one, charging conspiracy to defraud and using the mails for fraudulent purposes. All were released on bonds of \$6,000 each. The following are the names of those taken into custody: G. S. Blackman of Denver, fiscal agent of the Lost Builion company; W.-B. Cameron of Boulder, Colo., former vice president; R. C. Hunt of Denver, former president; William R. Wilson of Boulder, director: David H. Lawrence of Denver, engineer alleged to have made favorable reports on the Lost Bullon property: Danton S. Pinkins of Denver, Lee Dubois of Denver, George S. Dubois of Denver, A. C. Keables of Denver, president of the Securities Investment & Mining comthen to

The two Dubbises were arrested in Pueblo, Cameron and Wilson at Boui² der and the others in this city.

Lee Dubois was superintendent of the company and is credited in the com-pany's prospectus with having dis-covered the mine through the aid of a Yaqui Indian, who knew of the mine from stories told by the Indians. Keables, it is charged, had no direct connection with the company, but is said to have negotiated the saje to the Lost Buillion company of the property in New Mexico.

Blackman and Levan were arrested some time ago when the government officials first started an investigation into the affairs of the Lost Bullion company and are awaiting trial on charges

pany and are awaiting trial on charges filed at that time. The government officials assert that the alleged mine is nothing more than an old cave and that it has no value as a mine. Some of the men under arrest say that a large cattle company is be-hind their arrest because the mine is located on their range, and the Lost Bullion company controls the water in that vicinity. The Lost Bullion Spanish Mines com-pany is incorporated under the laws of

Arizona and is capitalized at \$10,000,000. It is claimed that during the two months that the company did business more than \$60,000 worth of stock was sold.

Incorporated with 1,500,000 shares each, of which 1,000,000 would be offered to investors ostensibly to raise founds for development purposes. Very little development work, the govern-ment agents assert, was done, and that which was done was under the sole management of O'Hara, who charged rates very much higher than the aver-age paid for such work.
