### WEEK'S SALES ON MINING EXCHANGE.

A Total of 102,465 Shares Transferred for Which Was Paid the Sum of \$37,717.63.

### CON. MERCUR CLOSED LOWER.

Montana-Tonopah Active — Yankee Consolidated Displayed Weakness — Today's Quotations and Sales.

The business transacted on the Salt Lake Stock & Mining Exchange this week amounted to the transfer of 102,465 shares, for which was paid \$37,717.63. Scarcely a year ago this would have been considered only a fair day's business. Consolidated Mercur closed the week lower. It opened on Monday with a sale at 34 cents, while today 20 cents represented this closing bid. Yankee Consolidated had not been shipping as heavily as usual and this stock was also quoted at least 5 cents a share lower than it was at the beginning of the week.

At the meeting of the directors of the Daly-West held on Monday, the dividend was fixed at 40 cents, with a reduction from 45 cents. This settled all uncertainty concerning the future and led the way of putting some stiffening into the stock. It sold up to \$23. The lowest price quoted during the week was at \$22.25.

Silver King participated one day, 155 shares were sold at \$54.90 and \$45. Two hundred shares of Montana-Tonopah at 30 cents ranging from \$1.65 down to \$1.66. The stock closed higher again today, the last bid being marked up at \$1.625. Uncle Sam Consolidated was active at 19% down to 18 cents. Sacramento has fluctuated between 15 and 16 cents; 900 shares were transferred. Tetro changed hands to the extent of 6,400 shares. It closed about 5 cents below Monday's opening price.

### THE ZELNORA VEIN.

Bingham New Haven Company Opens It, Disclosing Rich Copper ore.

For more than two months rumors have been in circulation of a great strike at the Bingham and New Haven Co. and Company's mine, the so-called Highland Boy, and reference to them has been made in these columns, says the Bingham Bulletin. The management, however, has been reticent and even this week says nothing though allowing current reports to go for what they are worth. But the Bulletin has at length given some indications of the company's property, and it is difficult to make a reliable statement of them that comes from an undoubted source.

Three months ago, at about 2,000 feet in, the main tunnel encountered the Zelnora vein, for which it was making. It cut through eight feet of copper. Depth now is 200 feet, and some 100' raises have been made, all in four feet or ten feet wide. It is pronounced to be uniformly the best copper ore Bingham has produced—about one-third a first-class shipping product. Several days ago a chunk of Chalcopyrite that came out of one of the shafts was found to weigh 33 per cent copper, and there are large quantities of the same material that assay about the same value.

Today on the Frisco dump (mouth of long tunnel) are about 6,000 tons of the shipping ore and over 1,000 tons of mill tailings. As soon as the Clipper Hill road is open again we begin hauling the first cars to the depot. The road is in bad condition resulting from freshets, but a gang of men has been working on it several days and it should be repaired some time next week.

Parties who are qualified by long experience to express an opinion say that when the vein is fully developed the Zelnora is the southern extension of the great Highland Boy vein.

The latter shows a marked increase, which accounted for the increased tonnages coming to it through the interchange of ores with the American Smelting & Refining company.

If Prof. Carmichael and W. V. Landers, who have been exploiting their chlorination process in this region during the past few weeks, can do what they claim, there is no reason why they cannot do business with President Sam McIntyre of the Mammoth Mining company. The latter has made the gentlemen an offer and it is now up to them to demonstrate to the satisfaction of Mr. McIntyre just what can be done.

Apparently, Messrs. Landers and Carmichael are very diligent in their efforts and are still conducting a series of experiments at the mine. Prof. Carmichael, who was in the city several days ago, expressed himself as being well satisfied with results and one condition which he dreaded more than any other was overcome without the slightest difficulty. The experiments have been conducted at the tailings dump at the mill and the tailings being so fine, Prof. Carmichael feared he would encounter much difficulty with slime. But in this he was very cheerfully disappointed.

The experiments are expected to be completed in a day or two when it is understood that Brooks will resume his position as superintendent, from which he was suspended a couple of weeks ago.

Assistant Manager Ernest Bernberger returned from the Daly-West mine last night. He says the mill will be running full blast again in a few days and that the damage caused by the collapse of the ore bins on Thursday will not exceed \$2,000.

He resided at 165 Ninth East street and leaves a wife and two step-children to survive him. The funeral will be held from the family residence at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.

The daylights and daylight extensions show every evidence of being the foundation of a good mine.
