He, how a ever, finds an easy solution or cause for this apparent anomaly, in the outrageously unjust land laws existing there,-the laws of primogeniture and antail, by which, the land having in former times been conferred upon the aristogracy, the latter are enabled to retain possession of it under all circumstances.
