

## IT LOOKS OMINOUS.

Federal Army to Put a United States Squadron to Sea.

## SUNDAY SERVICES SUSPENDED.

The Disturbance Sees It is Decided to Let the Canon

Cause.

Chicago, June 22.—A special team New York says:

Under sufficient signs that the squadron of United States warships has been despatched to the harbor of New York will be dispatched east on an important mission. Those who should be in a position to know, say the destination will be the coast of Cuba.

During the last week work on all the vessels was suspended in response to a special order received from the Secretary of the Navy. The nature of this order is not known.

Every ton of the North Atlantic squadron, except the New York which is still in dry dock, was taking in coal yesterday.

On the Newark, Montague, Clinton, and Atlantic, there was constant alarm at the time. Five hundred sailors crowded alongside. Two barges were kept busy all day piling coal on deck.

Officers admitted that services were continued on board the ships on Tuesday, or expected it by the necessity of making repairs so that the ships might be in a condition to take the naval armada on their annual cruise early in July.

When asked if he expected orders to go to Cuba, Captain Edgerton, commanding the Newark, said:

"That I cannot tell about. Only the admiral is authorized to speak that point."
