LOCAL BRIEFS.

Lydia Y. Merrill has sold to Newell Beeman a five roomed brick cottage on Twelfth East street for \$2,400.

The Jewish New Year begins this evening with appropriate services by both of the congregations in this city.

Miss Emma Ramsey sang at the Sunday evening services in the First ward last evening. Her fine voice found much favor with the congregation.

A. R. Richardson's two-year-old child had his foot painfully injured yesterday in the city cemetery by a headstone falling on it while he was taken home and the injury attended to.

Mr. R. G. Lambert, one of the traveling representatives of the Deseret News, announces the convalescence of Hardy, his nine-year-old son who has been critically ill with diphtheria. The family, however, is still under quarantine.

The Deseret News has received some excellent samples of Utah fruit that were on exhibition at the late Irrigation congress in Ogden. They were sent to members of the staff by the state board of horticulture, to whom thanks is cordially extended.

Some time Saturday night the room of F. W. Stewart in the Taylor house on East Second South street was entered by burglars who stole a Zies astigmatic lens valued at \$85 and a razor and some other articles of the value of \$10. The matter was reported to the police.

Half the members of the state prison turned out yesterday to attend the regular morning session of the prison Christian Endeavor, and so much interest was shown that Judge Perrin of St. Paul, Minn., who was a visitor there at the time, remarked afterward that he thought he had got in with a lot of theological students instead of convicts.

## SHARPERS CAUGHT HIM.

Young Man from Iowa Easy Prey for a Pair of Smooth Grifters.

Thomas Rouke, a young man on his way home to Iowa, was fleeced out of \$175 and a ticket to his home state yesterday afternoon by allowing himself to be roped into a "brace game" of draw poker by a couple of smooth grifters.

Rouke came in from the west yesterday morning and as he had a few hours to spare, concluded he would take in the sights. He wandered up to the Temple ground and there fell in with a couple of well dressed "tourists". They, too, were taking in the sights and prepared to take in anything else that was not asked down. The three men strolled about the grounds for some time, and began to discuss religion. The question of whether card playing was right or wrong was discussed, and developed that Rouke's view on the subject was that card playing was all right, whether on Sunday or Wednesday. He accepted an invitation to accompany the two "tourists" to their room for a quiet little game with the limit at \$5. Rouke played in good luck but when he was about \$20 to the good, one of the men became angry and wanted the limit raised to \$75. Rouke and the other man were willing, and the game proceeded. The windup came when Rouke put up his Iowa ticket for \$25 worth of chips. In a short time he was out of the ticket and \$75. He left the place and walked out into the cool air to think. Before long a great light broke upon him and he made a race against time to the police station. He told the police of the little game and they smiled. Officers accompanied him to the room where the game had been played. The grifters had quietly departed. No trace of them could be found. Rouke will probably have to send home for funds.

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THE GRIMSDELL FUNERAL.

Old Time Friends and Associates Honor His Name and Memory.
