Springville, Utah Co., June 13.—Thursday, June 11, the funeral of Margaret E. Vanleusen, born in the Second ward meetinghouse, Counselor N. H. Packard in charge. The speakers were Elder B. T. Blanchard, Bishop O. C. Huntington and J. F. Brigham. Mrs. Vanleusen was born at Louisville, Ky., April 26, 1836, and died June 12, 1908. She was baptized at the age of eight years and came to Utah in 1850, settling in Cottonwood Salt Lake Co., moved to Springville in 1851, where she remained until death. She was twice married, leaving two sons and four daughters, 45 grandchildren, 22 great grand children. Her father, John M. Stewart, was counselor to Bishop Aaron Johnson, first bishop of Springville, he afterwards left for California, where he died.
