Last Night's Dispatches.

EASTERN.

CHICAGO, I.—The corner, for No. 2 Spring wheat, for July delivery, has been sold at \$4.40 a bushel. Sales were principally at 1:40 until 4 o'clock this afternoon, when all contracts were settled, and at 1:30 this afternoon No. 2 Spring wheat was selling for 4.50. The excitement is ended. It is impossible to ascertain how much the bulls have gained, but it is large. The whole affair has been sharply managed, but the general verdict is that it is exceedingly discreditable.

NEW YORK, I.—Berlin papers contain a letter from Baron Von Lichtenau, the director of the Bank of Mex. Lucas, repudiating and denouncing what he terms the villainous piece of baseness practised upon him. In New York, he is in dispute. He says he is leaving untouched all other shareholders in the bank, I, last Autumn, laid before the proper court in Berlin a complaint for divorce, on the ground of mutual abhorrence, and this proceeding is taking its regular course. The accusations raised against me, and through which, in connection with persons and other claimants, suits have been obtained, I declare to be most perfect untruths, as are also the hear-say declarations which are attributed to me, which is not even named. The trial, for hastening the proceedings commenced in a sudden and unheard-of manner, and this act of mine in New York, will be heard for divorce in New York, and states that he has moved in the court which granted a decree for me.

NEW YORK, I.—A terrible accident occurred this morning on the Hudson River, R. R., between Tarrytown and Irvington. A baggage express left this city at nine o'clock. The freight train, which was coming down, was shunted on to the track of the express, and came up over the rate of forty miles an hour. The express car was thrown off the track in safety. As the baggage car of the express train passed the engine of the freight train, one end of the latter jumped the track, and the baggage car, which was completely wrecked, was in. D. Warren and wife, a young girl, the daughter of Mrs. Warren, were fatally injured, being struck by a pane of glass and her skull fractured. Her neck bone protruded from her face. Mr. Warren also suffered terrible injuries, while his wife and daughter were fatal. Miles O'Brien, of this city, had his right arm completely shattered. John V. Vaughan, the though baggage master, received terrible injuries about the head, and his death is momentarily expected. The engineer and fireman of the freight train jumped from their engines and saved their lives. About forty passengers, mostly prominent New Yorkers, were wounded, but not too badly to be removed by special cars to Saratoga. The accident is said to occur in the same manner as the New Hamburg disaster, in which a brother of Vassarburg, the victim of to-day, was killed, namely, by jumping off the baggage car from the middle-severed freight cars were wrecked.
