Cincinnati.—The National Board of Trade held a protracted session to-day; the only business of real importance transacted was the passage of resolu-tions, presented from the Chicago Board of Trade, declaring that a custom prevails in the seaboard cities of selling produce nominally for cash, but really on credit, of five to fifteen days, from which practice the western consignor suffers loss, therefore, resolved that it is the opinion of the National Board of Trade that all sales of grain, provisions and other property, consigned for sale on the owners' account, should be sold for cash on delivery. The local Boards are recommended to adopt proper regu-lations in conformity with these resolutions. The resolutions caused much discussion, but were finally adopted by 49 to 26.

New York.-A letter is published from General Howard, in which he says he has no doubt the continuance of the Freedmen's Bureau in those States not yet reconstructed, would be a benefit to the freedmen, but he don't think its continuance absolutely necessary, or adequate, without other aid, to protect their lives and secure them their political rights. He says that in many parts of the late slave States it is difficult for colored men to get justice in the inferior Courts, and in many counties their rights are positively disregarded, and among certain classes they are hated, and only time can eradicate these evils. In the reconstructed States protection can still be extended by the military acts. He will continue the school work in Virginia, with all the means at his command.
