It places

The Judge properly puts the influ-ence in this direction of the clergy, in the front rank of anti-"Mormon" bigotry; the clergy stand first on the list of violent persons afflicted with "a diseased sentiment." They have been foremost from the first in exciting the unthisking multitude against the "Mormons." Ministers of religion headed mobs in Kirtland, Missouri and Illicols against the Latter-day Saints. Not only by inflammatory harangues did they incite rioters to plunder, pli-lage and murder the "Mormons," but in numerous instances they should red the rife and carried the torch to shoot down the Saints and burn their tollearned homes. Lies manufactured earned homes.
