AMERICAN.

NEW YORK, 10.—Secretary Bristow came to this city from Washington yesterday, and had a conference of about four hours with the collector at the custom house; the object of his visit and consultation was kept secret, and politicians calling were as ignorant as the clerks.

The lifeless body of Catherine Maxwell, age 35, was found yesterday on the floor of her apartment in a tenement house, 299 Nevins St., near Union Street, Brooklyn, where she lived with her husband, James B. Maxwell, age 36, and two children, aged seven years and twenty-one months respectively; the eyes were blackened, the face bruised and swollen, and one of the arms was severely bruised and was bandaged. The husband has been arrested, but denies that he murdered his wife.

In another suit brought by the city against Wm. M. Tweed, etc., Judge Lawrence, of the supreme court, has ordered that the defendant be furnished a bill of particulars, and have ten days to answer after the receipt thereof.

Mrs. Lovejoy, while bathing at Southampton, L. I., on Saturday, was carried beyond her depth; a boy went to her assistance, but she seized and held him so tightly that he could do nothing. George W. Fishback, formerly proprietor of the St. Louis Democrat, who was riding along the beach, plunged in and saved both the lady and the boy.

A letter from Fall River, where fifteen thousand mill operatives voted themselves thirty days vacation rather than submit to ten per cent. reduction in wages, states that the action of the grocery and provision dealers, in refusing to credit, will speedily be felt, for the available funds of most of the employees must be nearly exhausted, and that while it is not the policy of the municipal government to allow actual starvation, charity will be dispersed very sparingly, and that the feeling of the community is so decidedly against the operatives that they will resist all measures for relief not absolutely called for in the light of humanity. In the meanwhile the mill owners say they are determined to maintain their position, and settle for ever the principle that their business is not to be at the mercy of help, that they have been governed by the operatives too long, and that they now propose to manage their own business in their own way.

President Jewett, of the Erie Railway, while driving to his house on Staten Island, last evening, had his leg broken by the upsetting of his carriage.

CHICAGO, 10.—A Washington special says that in the investigation conducted by Attorney General Pierpont into the working of the United States Marshal's offices, he has found other places than the south where the stern hand of a reformer is needed, and it will be some time before Pierpont will have cleared away the monumental corruption accumulated under the reign of Williams. The latest case occurs in Colorado. Ex-marshal Shaffenburg, who was recently removed to make way for Marshal Tompkins, had, it appears, during the six or seven years of his reign, continually manufactured fraudulent accounts. While the expenditures of officials were under the supervision of the Secretary of the Interior, the Colorado marshal was allowed \$1.25 per day for keeping prisoners from the time he arrested them until they were disposed of by the courts of the Territory. When the Department of Justice was created, and the expenditures of the court and federal officers were put under the control of the Attorney General, this allowance of a dollar and a quarter per day for keeping prisoners, was still allowed the Colorado marshal. Upon Shaffenburg's appointment as marshal he saw a rich mine for fraud in his charge for keeping prisoners, which, until a few months ago, he had worked successfully. He has charged for keeping prisoners that he has never arrested, charged for keeping prisoners months before he had them in custody, and months after they were released, and the result has been that from a tender of a lager beer stand, Shaffenburg's occupation before he was appointed

ed marshal, he has become one of the most opulent citizens of Denver, rivaling ex-Delegate Chaffee in the magnificence of his mansion and the splendor of his entertainments. These fraudulent acts, as passed upon by the accounting officer of the Treasury, were approved by the federal judge of the Territorial court of Colorado. The matter has been turned over to the Attorney-general, who has ordered the arrest of Shaffenburg, but the ex-marshal has fled the Territory. Besides the criminal process against him, civil suits will immediately be begun to recover the amount of money fraudulently taken from the treasury, which is variously estimated at from sixty to seventy-five thousand dollars.

FT. LARAMIE, 10.—Captain Pollock left here this morning, to assume command of the new post, temporarily established in the Black Hills for the purpose of keeping out miners. This post will be garrisoned by his own company of the 9th infantry, Captain Henry's of the 3rd cavalry, and Captain Wells of the 2nd cavalry. Captain Andrews, of the 3rd cavalry, left this morning to join his company in the Black Hills.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 9.—The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the European grain market, says: "The weather, though broken, has been, on the whole, tolerably fine, and the crops are progressing favorably, but it is unreasonable to expect either the quality or abundance of last year after a nearly sunless July and such a heavy rainfall as the season thus far has brought in France, so that flour has risen four francs per sack in Paris." The Express adds: "The bulk of our own harvest is yet uncut; some of our country markets have hesitated about submitting to any decline, though it has generally reached 1 @ 2 shillings per quarter. Large speculative purchases have been made in London on the American account. The London market closed with an improved aspect and an upward tendency, which must be swayed entirely by the weather."

Sir Chas. Addersy's shipping bill to-day passed its second reading in the Lords.

A Special to the Standard from Glasgow reports that sixty rioters, many of whom are badly hurt, were brought before the magistrates yesterday a. m., and remanded to jail. The rioting broke out again in the suburbs on Monday, and volunteers and regulars were ordered to be ready, but the disturbance was quieted by the reading of the riot act. It is remarked that mobs of Catholics, armed with hatchets, street knockers and knives, are organized and acting under leaders, and it is reported that several men in custody are head centres.
