Menus for Next Three Days.

SUNDAY.

BREAKFAST.

Cereal. Spanish omelet. Cream. Corned beef hash. Coffee.

DINNER.

Roast duck. Apple sauce. Stewed prunes. Mashed potatoes. Celery salad.

Cheese. Water. Tapioca pudding. Lemon sauce. Coffee.

SUPPER.

Whole Wheat bread. Canned plums. Cocoa. Cake.

MONDAY.

BREAKFAST.

Steamed flax with cream. Cereal. Scrambled eggs with tomatoes. Coffee cake. Coffee.

LUNCHEON.

GINNER.

Pickered Salad.

Take the remains of cold-boiled pickered, break carefully into small pieces, bring sauce to remove all bones and skin. Place in a bowl and pour over it a plain French dressing, stand in a cool place for an hour or two. Line a salad bowl with lettuce leaves, place on this the fish, sprinkle over it a little chopped parsley and garnish with rings of hard-boiled eggs.

Sardine Salad.

Select a fine head of endive, wash thoroughly and pick off all the bleached leaves. Place these in cold salted water and when ready to use, arrange on a flat dish. On the leaves arrange the sardines, placing the heads in the center and bodies extending outward like the spokes of a wheel. Pour over all a plain French dressing and garnish with parsley slices of lemon and radishes cut to resemble tulips.

Inquiries Answered.

Mrs. M. E. S. Wright: Will you kindly publish recipe for an inexpensive two-layer cake?

Inexpensive Layer Cake.

Cream two ounces of butter with one cup of granulated sugar and then beat up until very light and creamy with two whole eggs, adding one at a time without previous beating. Then add half a cup of water or milk. Mix two teaspoonsful of baking powder with two cups of sifted flour and stir this into the other mixture, beating until the batter is light and smooth. This should be a sufficient amount of flour, but depends on the kind and quality used. The batter must not run too easily. Bake in two layers in a quick oven. This is an old-time recipe that admits of a dozen or more variations. The eggs may be separated and each part beaten in usual manner before adding them; the whites put in last. Use any flavor desired.

Cake Without Eggs.

When eggs are scarce and high this recipe will be found quite satisfactory for a plain cake. If baked in layers a rich filling may be used, if the cake seems too plain.

Beat one and one-half cups of granulated sugar to a cream with two ounces of butter; then add one cup of rich milk, alternating flour and sugar, two cups of sifted flour mixed with two level teaspoonsful of baking powder. Beat the batter long and well, adding the tea-spoonful of flavoring. Bake in a moderate oven.

Sheep's Head Soup.

M. D. M. writes: If sheep's head is ever used in cookery will you kindly give a good way of dressing and serving it?

Have the head well washed and cleaned—first having it split in half—then put it into a kettle with a gallon of water, two medium-sized onions, two carrots, two turnips, part of a root of celery, two sprigs of parsley, a dozen peppercorns, eight whole cloves, two spoonfuls of salt, and quarter of a pound of well-washed barley. Cook very gently until meat is very tender, then remove it to a hot dish and strain the liquor; let this cool and then remove all the fat and return the broth to the fire and thicken with two table-spoonfuls of brown flour. Cut the sheep's tongue into thin slices, and the meat from the head into neat dice and heat up in the soup; then serve with little dumplings; egg balls or force-meat balls.

Cold Boiled Potatoes Fried.

Mrs. H. N. B. writes: Do you consider fried, cold boiled potatoes very indigestible?

As they are usually done, yes. Most cooks allow the potatoes to become cold and solid before frying them. If the watery kind are used, the starch grains adhere so closely together they are not easily separated by the gastric juices and the coating of fat quickly surrounding each piece or slice of potato makes it still more difficult for the work to go on. The best way to fry cold boiled potatoes is to make them into small fried potatoes, and for this method of frying it is much better to use fresh boiled potatoes, peeled and chopped while still hot and not allowed to get cooled at all.

Acid With Beans.

D. J. Wright: Is there any dietetic reason why tomato sauce is served with baked beans, or is it simply a matter of taste?

The digestion of peas, beans and lentils is aided by the ordinary food acids; a fact recognized instinctively by the taste.

Lemon Waffles.

Miss M. F. G. writes: Can you oblige me with a recipe for lemon waffles? Measure two cupfuls of sifted flour and sift again with three level table-spoonfuls sugar, two level teaspoonfuls baking powder, and a pinch of salt; add two well beaten eggs to a pint of milk and two tablespoonfuls of butter and grated rind of a lemon. Mix to a smooth thin batter, bake and serve with lemon honey.

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
