HUNDRED MILES OF NEW RAILWAY Illinois Central Will Cut Time to New Orleans.

Railroads in Arizona-May Abolish Title of Braheman-Notes of the Lines.

Vice President and General Manager Harahan of the litinois Central has gone to Paris, France, for the purpose of conferring with other high officials of the world's railroads, upon the matter of holding a world's congress of railroads, Hefore leaving Mr. Hurahan nois Central will at once construct 100 miles of new line between Morenbla and New Orleans.
