

DRISKEELL MAKES FULL CONFESSION

Police Declare He Will Plead Guilty to Charge of Murder.

TO DISCHARGE KENNEDY.

This, in View of Developments in the Case, Appears as Strange Procedure.

L. E. Driskeell, of California, 24 years of age, confessed Monday night that he shot and killed Special Officer C. C. Riley, on the night of Oct. 5, after he had held up and robbed Knutson's Saloon, of 938 east First South street, according to statements given out by Chief of Police Barlow and Chief of Detectives George Sheets. Driskeell has not made nor signed a written confession.

An agreement is said to have been made between the police and Driskeell that if he would confess, he would be arraigned before the district court on a charge of murder in the first degree; that Driskeell would plead guilty; that then the charge would be changed to murder in the second degree; and that Driskeell would be given a life sentence.

Chief of Police Barlow stated this morning that the police had arrived at the conclusion that R. E. Kennedy, who was arrested by the Ogden officers in that city with Driskeell and has since been held here in the city prison, had no connection with the holdup of Nebecker or the murder of Riley. Chief Barlow said that Kennedy will probably be released on a six-months' "furlough" and will be ordered to leave the city.

After facing the torture of the third degree for nine hours, from 12 o'clock Monday noon until 9 o'clock Monday night, L. E. Driskeell broke down at last under the savage "swetting" of Chief of Detectives Sheets and is said by the police to have made the following confession, without hope of reward or fear of punishment, and without threats, blows or intimidation or promises of any kind whatsoever:

"I shot Riley. He had married me when he arrested me. I had a gun and slipped my gun down in front of my pants under the waistband, and he overlooked it. When we were going toward the saloonhouse, I stepped on the curbstone and accidentally pulled loose from Riley, which caused him to move his foot and shoot me, which I believed to be in his own pocket. I then went for my gun, which was in front of my pants, and beat him to it, shooting immediately as I drew the gun from my pants. I knew I got him with this shot, but shot again because he fell, making sure I had him before I left."

According to the story of the confession as told by the police, Driskeell said that on the night he killed Riley, he met a negro whom he had seen but once before, and whose name he did not know, and that the negro, while they were talking at the end of Commercial street, said: "Let's go out and stick some one up."

The detectives say that they showed Driskeell his alleged to have been found in the alley and that he said: "That is me."

The detectives say that they showed him a gun and that he said: "That is the gun Out! I killed Riley with. That is my gun and it has not been shot or cleaned since, and it was left in a bureau drawer at my room in Ogden."

Chief of Police Barlow this morning absolutely refused to allow Driskeell to be interviewed in the News representative for the holding of Nebecker and the murder of Riley. The peculiar circumstances which have surrounded this case from the beginning are highly intensified by the fact that both Chief of Police Barlow and Chief of Detectives Sheets are on record as having made statements for publicizing Riley's declaration that there were absolutely positive that not only Driskeell but Kennedy, too, had killed Nebecker; that Nebecker had identified Kennedy as well as Driskeell; and that Kennedy was implicated as deeply in the murder of Riley as Driskeell.
