What the latter did to the local crowd is a shame. They simply walked all over them from start to finish and shut them out, the score being 9 to 0.

Wiggs, the big Salt Lake pitcher, did all he could, not intentionally, of course, to help Seattle get runs. He passed to first base just 11 men. He was extremely wild all the time, and he did not get one out of the plate. It was generally hit over for a run or two.

British Financial Controversy.

London, July 28.—Gov. P. O. Schuster, at a meeting of the United States Bankers' Association today made a lengthy reference to the British fiscal controversy. While he welcomed an inquiry into the fiscal policy of the government, the whole tenor of Mr. Schuster was opposed to tampering with free trade. He expressed the belief that the United States was within measurable distance of adopting free trade, and in support of this he had a private interview with the late President McKinley two years ago in which the latter said:

"My tariff bill has done its work. We have been able to build up many great industries in a short time and now gradually but inevitably, our tariff must be reduced."

Mr. Schuster contended that America's industrial position under protection was "not entirely attractive nor its workmen contented."

Minister Primrose's Wife Dies.

Buffalo, N. Y., July 29.—Mrs. Emma Primrose (nee Catlin), wife of George H. Primrose, the minister, died here today of heart paralysis. Mr. Primrose has concealed his engagements and will come on from Chicago on a morning train.

Delaware Anti-Trust Law Invalid.

Delaware, O., July 29.—The circuit court in a decision handed down today declared the criminal clause of the Delaware anti-trust law to be unconstitutional. The decision was rendered on appeal in the case of Percie W. George, one of the seven local coal

dealers who comprised the Delaware Coal Dealers' association, and who were indicted, pleaded guilty and fined for violation of the anti-trust law under the criminal clause. The case will be carried to the state supreme court.

Danville Rioters Arrested.

Danville, Ill., July 29.—Eleven arrests were made today for participation in the lawless outbreak of Saturday night, when the jail was attacked in an effort to lynch James Wilson, a negro, who, it is believed, assaulted Mrs. Burgess at Alvin. The grand jury has been ordered to reconvene on Monday to indict the leaders of the mob. Of these arrested today only one gave bond. A guard has been placed around the hospital, where five men who were members of the mob are receiving treatment for their wounds.

No One to Blame for Collision.

Washington, July 29.—The naval board which investigated the recent collision in Newport harbor between the torpedo boat Winted and the yacht City, has reported to the navy department that the accident was caused by the crowded condition of the harbor and that the commander of the torpedo boat was obliged to choose between grounding his vessel and striking the City. The government will pay the damages. No further proceedings are recommended.

To Make Chinese Entry Easy.

Washington, July 29.—Taking note of the criticisms that have been passed at home and abroad on the application of the Chinese exclusion laws to the incoming Chinese who are to set up the Chinese exhibit at the St. Louis exposition, the president has directed a considerable change in the existing rules. The amended rules are now in press, and it is said, will make the entry of Chinese who are not students, to evade the exclusion laws easy. The Chinese minister here has expressed his satisfaction with the change.

VICTIMS OF A STORM.

Six Killed and Four Seriously Hurt in One at Alameda, Mich.

Alameda, Mich., July 29.—A severe wind, rain and thunderstorm, accompanied by hail, passed over Alameda and Presque Isle counties last night, doing much damage to fruit and crops. Six persons were killed and four seriously injured by lightning.

The dead: James Fingleton, in Wintedown; James DeForest, and his wife, at Hartsville; Del Crothers, near Onaway; Andrew Hanson and a cousin, at Long Rapids.

Demurrer in n's Case.

Washington, July 29.—The district supreme court today refused to grant a demurrer in the case of August W. Machen, formerly general superintendent of the free delivery division of the postoffice department, to the indictment against him. The demurrer will be filed in court in a day or two.

CAPE EVEN TESTIFIES.

On the stand today, he testified that he had made different statements.

Cynthiana, Ky., July 29.—Capt. Even left the stand at 3:30 p. m. after he had been subjected to a rigorous cross-examination by the attorneys for the defense. After his testimony Capt. Even was escorted by the militia to Camp Licking. On the witness stand it developed that he had made different statements to Judge Hargis and others immediately affecting Hargis in Breathitt county. He gave his reasons that he was afraid of Hargis and Callahan. He said that Hargis, Callahan and another man called him into consultation immediately after the killing and told him what to say, and that he had agreed to do so, as he was afraid of being killed then and there.

Capt. Even gave as his reason for leaving Sunday night that he feared no guard would be provided for him.

Korupatkin Well Pleasured.

London, July 29.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the Daily Mail reports that Gen. Korupatkin, the Russian minister of war, who has just returned from the Port Arthur conference, describes himself greatly pleased with the result of his tour and he communicated to the czar that although a fairly strong party in Japan wanted war with Russia the bulk of the people seemed against it, and the mikado was well disposed towards Russia. A correspondent says that the situation has been cleared for a long time and that war is very improbable.

Killed by Lightning.

Pittsburg, July 29.—During an electrical storm this morning a number of Italians took refuge in a building which was struck by lightning. The lightning struck the building and three others injured.
