FRUIT GROWERS COMPLAIN.

Florida Shippers Feel Injustice is Being Done Them in Rates.

New York, Aug. 10.—Florida fruit growers have raised the question of the "distance factor" in railroad rates by complaining to the interstate com-merce commission that they are charg-ed almost as much for carriage to New York as California growers pay. JUDGE DIDN'T SEE POINT.

Man Charged With Robbing Bath Houses Did Not Get Money Back.

Houses Did Not Get Money Back. After presenting an order to the sheriff for \$130 which was taken from his client, R. H. Bluim, after his ar-rest for robbing bath rooms at Saltair on July 24, Atty. J. W. Wootten yes-terday afternoon undertook to argue Judge Armstrong into the notion of ordering Sheriff Emery to turn the money over to him. Wootten claimed that the only victim who has con-plained so far lost only \$41.10 and that the remainder of the money in the pos-session of the sheriff could not be used in any way as evidence and hence should be turned over to him upon the order signed by Bluim. Judge Armstrong could not see it that way and refused to enter such an order.

CLAIMS \$5,000 DAMAGES.

Suit has been filed in the district court by Sarah S. Jennings against Joseph S. Daynes to recover damages in the sum of \$5,000 for injuries to her in the sum of \$3,000 for injuncts to here property on D street alleged to have been caused by water flowing from the Daynes property. It is alleged that defendant so drains his premises that all the water runs into plaintiff's cellar, thereby damaging her property in the sum mentioned above.
