TALK OF THE TOWN

Last night was sultry. A great season for floods. See "Fun on the Bristol" tonight.

Four tramps have been sent up for 30 days apiece. Obed Taylor, Esq., architect, is reported to be seriously ill.

Remember the election next Monday and vote the People's Ticket. Nothing has been said of the comet lately. It has almost disappeared.

Surveyor Doremus and party are prosecuting their labors west of Utah Lake. Mr. John Russell is the agent for the Utah Central Railway in this city.

Look out for marriages. The match factory is about ready to commence business. The Quarterly Conference of Cache Stake is to be held on Saturday and Sunday.

Supr. G. M. Ottinger has something to say about lawn sprinklers in this evening's News. Several new buildings are going up on Second South Street, east of the Presbyterian Church.

Dr. Ellen B. Ferguson lectures in Ogden this evening. Subject: "To Rome and back in an hour." A rattlesnake 6 feet 9 inches in length, having 7 rattles, was recently killed at Harmony, Kane County.

Jim Bridger, the celebrated western hunter, pioneer and scout, died on the 17th, at his home near Kansas City. Louis Peggler's fine new row of brick buildings on Third South Street, 7th Ward, is about completed.

Serenading the Senators.—Senator John Sherman, of Ohio, and Senator B. Harrison, of Indiana, and the party of distinguished tourists who have lately arrived in Salt Lake, were serenaded last evening at the Walker House, by the 14th Infantry Band, and in response to calls from the populace, which assembled beneath the portico of the hotel, both of the above-named gentlemen addressed the multitude. Senator Sherman thanked the band for the serenade, eulogized the climate and scenery of Utah, and predicted that Salt Lake would yet be the center of trade and commerce in the West. Referred to differences of opinion existing between the people here and the rest of the Union of which they form a part, and urged the people of Utah to assimilate their opinions with those of the great majority, and do their share toward removing everything that would tend to divide and discord from their midst. He said this must be one country, one flag, and one people.

General Harrison expressed similar sentiments to those of Senator Sherman, praised the land, water, and general characteristics of the country, spoke eloquently of the future prospects of the Territory, and closed by saying that whatever service he could render the people in the United States Senate, he would do it gladly. Judge Strong, formerly of the United States Supreme Court, followed with a series of complimentary remarks and expressions of good will toward the land and the people. Other speakers addressed the assembly, which dispersed between 10 and 11 o'clock.

"Fun on the Bristol."—This musical comedy, which is to be presented here on Thursday, Friday and Saturday next, is spoken of by the National Republican, Washington, D. Upon the threat of the nuptials, and the string rare musical and dramatic gems, specimens of eccentric acting, selections from the operas, parodies, and character sketches and songs.

The fun of a hundred performances has been sketched and is presented in three acts. The stage setting is superb. The company is composed of the most talented and talented vocalists. All of the members of the company are artists.

Pioneer Day Celebrations.—Mr. J. R. Clark writes from Grantsville, Tooele County, of the celebration of Pioneer Day held there on the 25th. A procession started from the City Hall a little after 9 a. m., under the direction of S. W. Woolley, Marshal of the day, accompanied by inspiring music from the band led by Capt. James Battelle. The subsequent exercises in the meeting house consisted of songs, speeches, recitations, toasts, sentiments, etc. In the afternoon the children had a party, and in the evening the adults engaged in a similar event at the City Hall. No accidents occurred and all passed off peaceably and pleasantly.
