

resolution that would encourage the breaking of the law. If a man was shaved in a hotel barber shop on Sunday he would go there for the same purpose during the week.

Beil moved to amend so that transient hotel guests and other transient persons stopping temporarily in the city might be shaved on Sunday.

Moran—A motion to refer is not amendable.

The Mayor—The point is well taken.

A vote was then taken on the motion to refer, and was voted down, and the matter then came before the house on Beil's amendment.

Moran inquired if Mr. Ewing's guests would object to being shaved in some private room of the hotel on Sunday.

Ewing and Beardsley both simultaneously answered in the affirmative.

Hardy again called attention to the Territorial statutes, saying that the adoption of such a resolution was certainly illegal.

Folland took the same view of the matter, and said it was class legislation.

The resolution was, according to the ruling of the chair passed on a vote of 9 to 3; Folland, Hardy and Moran voting against it.

Moran took the stand that the resolution was in the nature of an ordinance and declared that it had not been legally passed as it required three readings, and he therefore moved to lay it on the table indefinitely.

The mayor—I do not think a resolution can be considered in the same light as an ordinance and will hold that it is passed.

#### TO RAISE TO PERMANENT GRADE.

The following was drawn up and presented by Beil:

Resolved, That the cross walks on the north side of East South Temple street, at the intersection of streets, be raised to present grade of sidewalk, beginning at State street to and including G street. Adopted.

#### IN PAMPHLET FORM.

Moran offered the following:

Resolved, That hereafter the recorder be required to furnish to the mayor and members of this Council, in pamphlet form, a copy of the minutes of the proceedings of this body, said copy of minutes to be furnished not later than the day first prior to date of regular meeting.

Laid on the table until Tuesday night.

#### PUBLIC MARKET HOUSE.

Wantland offered the following motion:

That a special committee of three be appointed by the mayor to report upon the feasibility of establishing a public market house.

Laid on the table until Tuesday night.

#### HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATIONS.

Wantland also offered the following:

That the health commissioner be requested to inspect and report upon the construction of and the accommodations provided by the hospitals of the city. Adopted.

#### INSPECTION OF PROVISIONS.

Motion by Wantland:

That the health commissioner be requested to report the best methods adopted by other cities for the inspection of

provisions; also to recommend a plan which in his opinion should be adopted by this city.

Adopted.

#### AN EXAMINING BOARD.

From the same gentleman:

That the chief of the fire department, city marshal and building inspector be requested to act as a special committee to examine the buildings within business districts and report a list of buildings which in their opinion should be condemned and removed.

Adopted.

#### TO INCREASE THE WATER SUPPLY.

The city engineer submitted the following:

The approach of the season when the maximum quantity of water is required and used through our pipe system, and in view of the labor and expense necessary to make available the increased supply from Parley's and Emigration creeks which will be necessary to meet the increased requirements of former years, I regard it a duty to formally report to your honorable body a matter to which I have already called the attention of several individual members and which is also mentioned in the annual report of the superintendent of waterworks.

The plan for the introduction of water from Parley's and Emigration creeks contemplates the use of the present main which was laid several years ago along First South Street, from the excavation for a reservoir on Thirteenth East street. This main varies in size from 30 inches in diameter at its head to 16 inches in diameter at Eleventh East street. From Eleventh East street to East Temple street pipes of 6 and 8 inches diameter are the largest now laid and the capacity of these will be the gauge of the increased supply which can be introduced west of Eleventh East street under the present system and will not carry more than one-tenth of the water from Parley's and Emigration creeks. To modify our present pipe system so that it will properly distribute the increased supply of water, a sixteen inch cast-iron main should be extended from Eleventh East along First South to Fourth East street at least, and an extension to Main street would be still better, inasmuch as it would insure a more plentiful and direct supply to the heart of the system.

Your early consideration of this matter is most earnestly recommended.

Accompanying the above was a report from the committee on streets asking the adoption of the engineer's suggestions.

Hardy moved to refer it to the committee on ways and means and the committee on waterworks associated.

Lawson said that action should be taken immediately or no benefit would be derived from the Parley's canyon conduit system the coming summer.

Evans said that it would take at least forty days to get the pipe from the East, and Moran added that fifty days more would be consumed in laying the pipe.

Moran said there was nothing to be gained by referring it as Mr. Hardy asked for, as the committee on waterworks knew just what the cost would be. It would amount to about \$3.80 per foot.

Lawson—Or a total of \$25,000 or \$28,000.

Horn said he was in favor of putting it through at once. He knew there was a scarcity of city funds, but he would rather go short of money than water any time.

Loofbourn moved to amend that the whole matter be referred to the Mayor to invite bids for the work. Carried.

#### STANDARD OF MEASURE.

An ordinance establishing a standard of measurement was passed under a suspension of the rules.

#### SIDEWALK ORDINANCE.

A bill for an ordinance levying the tax for the assessment of the property on the east side of West Temple street, from the south line of Fourth South street to the north line of Sixth South street, same being in sidewalk district No. 7, was passed under a suspension of the rules.

#### GENERAL SEWER ORDINANCE.

Lawson offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the city attorney in connection with the city engineer be instructed to prepare and present to the next regular meeting of the City Council a general sewer ordinance, covering the building, referring, maintaining and every branch of the subject.

Adopted.

#### OVER JORDAN.

From Wantland:

That the city engineer furnish an estimate of cost of extending the official surveys west of the Jordan river.

Adopted.

#### THE ISSUANCE OF MORE BONDS.

An ordinance authorizing the issuance of \$600,000 more bonds was passed and Heiss offered a resolution, which was adopted, authorizing the Mayor to negotiate the sale of a part or all of the amount named in the ordinance. The resolution was adopted.

#### SIDEWALK ORDINANCE.

An ordinance levying the tax and for the assessment of property on both sides of East Temple street, beginning at the south line of South Temple street and extending to the north line of Third South street, being in sidewalk district No. 8, was passed under a suspension of the rules.

#### FOR THE BENEFIT OF THE MEMBERS.

The committee on municipal laws reported as follows:

We beg leave to report as follows on the resolution by Councilman Folland:

Resolved, That each ordinance presented to the City Council shall be printed and a copy thereof placed on the desk of each member of the Council for use of such member prior to the third reading thereof, unless otherwise ordered and for any particular case by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Council.

Laid on the table until Tuesday night.

#### STREET MATTERS.

Wantland called up the report of the street committee on Richards street, which recommended that the board of public works be authorized to execute the contract for the paving of the same and that the work be done regardless of the obstruction (White's meat market) at the south of the street.

This was done and the report, which was in accordance with the petition of Richards Brothers, was adopted.

The committee on streets recommended that the petition of A. H. Raleigh for repairs on Calne street be granted; that the petition of James Jack for temporary sidewalk grade on Fifth East street be granted; that the
