

"HAVE YOU PAID YOUR TAXES?"

PEOPLE do not generally pay taxes as pleasantly as they settle a bill for something to eat or to wear. Tax-paying is not a popular proceeding.

We do not believe there is any part of the civilized world where the tax payer has less real cause for the grumbling which is common when collection is in order, than in our growing and God-blessed Territory of Utah.

Tax-collecting time is at hand. Property owners should prepare to settle their obligations. Payment should not be driven off to the last day allowed by law, but should be attended to as early as possible.

THE court has also the power to remit the taxes of insane, idiotic and indigent persons to the amount of five dollars.

WE trust that all who regard the welfare of the community will respond without delay to the notice of the collector, that those who have been improperly assessed will present their complaints in the proper quarters in time and that those whose duty it is to relieve the wants of the poor, will see that no widow or other person unable to pay taxes is pushed to the wall by the operations of a law just, righteous, and necessary in itself, but which may be enforced to the injury of the distressed. Let the taxes be paid, but let no one be oppressed.
