The officer regarding him as the victim of an unwonted New Year's spree, summoned the patrol wagon and had him taken to the city jail, where he was lald out on the floor still in a deep stupor. Later in the forenoon, Budd's peculiar actions attracted unusual attention and an investigation revealed the fact that he was the victim of a more serious offense and that he was the man wrong-It was discovered that he under the influence of a drug and as soon as he was able to talk coherently he told an interesting story, the main features of which were that he had

picked up a stranger while coming into the city on a train late Wednesday night from southorn Utah. The two took a hack for up town, after taking a drink together. They had not rida drink together. They had not rid-len far when Budd says he began to feel dazed and told the stranger of his peculiar sensation, whereupon the former seized him by the throat and ch ed him severely.
