HARRIMAN SUMMONED

New York, Jan. 2.-E. H. Harriman, president of the Union Pacific, South-ern Pacific and other lines in the Union Pacific system and many members of his official staff have been summoned to testify before the interstate com-merce commission at sessions which will begin here Friday. Grand Master Heznahan of Locomotive Firemen Gives Him A Warning.

# DRASTIC MEASURES COMING.

Awaits an Immediate Answer-Not Received Will Feel Has Exercised Due Patience.

Peoria, Ill., Jan. 1 .- Grand Master Hannahan of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, tonight issued a second ultimatum of E. H. Harriman of the Southern Pacific railroad, warning him of the impending drastic measures that will be placed in effect unless he exercises his powers to terminate the grievances now prevailing. The telegram follows:

"Peoria, Ill., Jan. 1.-E. H. Harriman, president Southern Pacific, New York. "The dispute on the Atlantic system of the Southern Pacific company, not-withstanding statements to the conof the Southern Pacific company, not-withstanding statements to the con-trary, is between your company and our members. On other of your lines the feeling is growing that they may ex-pect the same injustice in the near fu-ture. If your representatives really de-sure athitration, we are anxious to ad-just in that way, and we insist that a third party should not be permitted to influence your company in this matter. "Once more, in justice to the men and the public, who will be affected by an extension of a striffe to other parts of your system, I ask you to exercise your authority and restore the conditions which the abrogation of the agreement took away from the Brotherhood of Loconcotive Firemen on May I. Your officials cattered willingly into an agres-ment with the Brotherhood of Engi-meers that nullified the same. "I awalt an immediate answer. Not hearing from you, I shall feel that I have exercised due patience and have served a final notice to the public. "J. J. HANNAHAN," "Grand Master, Brotherhood of Locon-motive Firemen and Enginemen."

The grand executive board of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen held an all-day session to-day with Grand Master Hannahan, and matters pertaining to the strike on the Southern Pacific system were consi-dered. An adjournment was taken late in the afternoon until tomorrow, when additional matters will come up for consideration. Nothing was made pub-lic, save the bare announcement that the board was in session. Grand Mas-ter Hannahan declined to make a state-ment.

### ARCHBP. RYAN ARRAIGNS FRENCH GOVERNMENT.

Philadelphia, Jan. 1.—Today's New Year reception to Archbishop Ryan was made notable by a scathing ar-raignment by the archbishop of the French government's treatment of the Catholic church, denouncing the offi-cials of the present government as in-fidels, whom he considered worse than pagans. The archbishop expressed the hope that a religions awakening in France would soon overthrow the op-pressors of the Christlan religion. He seid:

seld: "The infidels are worse than pa-gans. The pagan believes in God and in a hereafter, where the good are re-warded but the infidel does not. Pa-gans have some virtues mixed with their vices, but the modern infidel has all the vices without any of the re-deeming virtues of a pagan."



# New Orleans, Jan. 1.—La gnippe, one of the oldest custome distinctive to New Orleans, was abolished today by concerted action of the trades peo-ple, especially grocers, at the request of the board of health. La gnippe is a survival of the Spanish settlers, who preceded the French in Louisiana, and consists in giving to purchasers small favors, such as an apple or piece of candy. The board of health stopped it because of the rotted edibles given to children. to children.

## CARELESS FIREMEN

#### Responsible for Serious Injury of Five Persons.

Chicago, Jan. 2 .- Carelessness of firemen in erecting a ladder at a fire which partly destroyed the residence of Dr. P. H. Welch, 608 North State street, yesterday, was responsible for serious injury to five persons, two of whom were firemen, one woman whom the firemen were endeavoring to rescue, the fourth a small boy who stood watching the fire and the fifth a passing

man. In their haste to raise the ladder to the third story of the house and rescue Mrs. C. H. Cooke, 60 years of age, mother of Mrs. Welch, the firemen neg-lected properly to connect it in the mid-die and it collapsed under the weight of the two men and the woman, precipi-tating all three to the pavement. The end of the ladder as it fell struck the boy on the head, causing a fracture of the skull. The ire started in the basement from The fire started in the basement from

The fire started in the basement from an overheated furnace and gained strong headway before it was discov-ered. Ten members of Dr. Welch's household, including Dr. and Mrs. Welch, their six children, the nurse, Miss Nellie Coriett, and Mrs. Crooke, were on the second and third floors. The nurse distinguished herself as the heroine of the day by rescuing the two younger children from suffocation on the third floor after all other resi-dents of the house had escaped. Dr. Welch, Mrs. Cook and the nurse es-caped by the means of ladders placed barely in time by the firemen. The loss amounts to \$25,600.

RUSSIAN MURDER MYSTERY.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 1.—The mys-ry surrounding the murder of former eputy Hertzenstein has, after months i lovestigation, finally been unraveled. of lovestigation, finally been unraveled. Hertzenstein, who was a member of the lower house of parliament from Mos-cow, was murdered at his country house near Terioki, Finiand, on July 31, 1906. A secret committee of the Constitutional Democratic party has traced the entire conspiracy and has obtained definite proof that the deed was the work of the League of Rus-sian People. A man named Muske-vitch is a prominent leader of this league and it is alleged hired the as-sassing to kill Herzenstein. The proofs have been placed in the hands of the public prosecutor and an effort is being made to bring the case

## WALL FELL.

### Killed One Man, Hurt Two Others,

One Fatally.

One Fatally. San Francisco, Jan. 1.-A wall of masonry, which fell shortly before noon today, killed one man, mangleT another so badly that he will in all probability die, and seriously injured a third. Another man, working direct-ly underneath the falling mass of debris, who was thought for several hours to be buried beneath the pile. had a narrow escape, stepping out of the path of death by a fraction of a second.

The accident occurred in the ruins of The old California Can company's building at Seventh and Townsend streats. The laborers were engaged in razing a wall about 12 feet high, and had undermined it in the center pre-paratory to pulling it down with ropes.

While the men were working beneath tottering ruins a passenger train of Southern Pacific company thun-red by, and the slight shock caused wails to crash down without warn-

ing. Bystanders began disging frantically to unearth the two burled men, and succeeded in taking two of them out of the pile alive. T. Uneo, a third man, who was caught by the avalanche of bricks, was dead when the rescuers reached his body.

### FOUND MURDERED.

FOUND MURDERED. New York, Jan, 1.—Mrs. William Wilson, wife of a stable man in Wel-lington, N. J., was found murdered in her home when her husband returned from work today. She had evidently been dragged from her bed, for she still wore her night clothes. Ehe had apparently been strangled with a towel, which was twisted around her neck. Besides, there was a stab wound in the stomach and a blow upon the head had made a hole in the skull.
