Trieste, Austria, Feb. 16.-As a result of the strikes martial law has been proclaimed here. Altogether 100 arrests have been made. In some of the trades it is expected work will be resumed tomorrow. A cold blustering wind was blowing

and it was snowing hard at the funeral tonight of the victims of the encounters between the strikers and the troops. Extraordinary manifestations of mourning were witnessed. A military escort accompanied the

funeral cortoge and the cometery, was guarded by troops. There were no disorders and the troubles are believed

to be ended. The riots are the worst that have happened in Austria in many years. The original strike is supposed to be an outcome of Socialist or anarchist agitation. During Friday's riot 12 persons were killed and 25 wounded, while on Saturday four persons met death, including the police commissioner, who was killed by a revolver shot. TWO NEGRO OUTLAWS.

Escape from Jail Atier Killing Prominent Young Man.

Sumpterville, Fia., Feb. 16 .- Henry Wilson and Julius Goodwin, notorious negro outlaws, escaped from jail here today, after killing Lee Graham, one of the most prominent young men in town, and wounding George Stafford and Willie Porter, who had tried to orral them.

The outlaws made a savage attack on Deputy Sheriff Charles Lane today as he was leading them into their cells The officer was seriously wounded and the men ran through the jailer's resi dence. There they were attacked by Mrs. Lane, armed with a Winchester rifie, The negroes wrenched th weapon from her, and when the wo th man's screams attracted a crowd they barricaded themselves behind their victim

George Stafford was danderously wounded in the head with a club and will die. Porter was badly wounded in a clinch fight. As the news spread scores of persons rushed to the scene.

Wessels and Wolmarens Journey to America Has No Diplomatic Object.
