HOME ITEMS.

SPANISH FORK.—By letter from Spanish Fork dated 18th inst., we regret to learn that through the winter whooping cough has prevailed among the children to a great extent, in many cases terminating fatally. At the above date, the weather was warm and fine, the gold fever had greatly abated, and spring work,—ploughing and sowing were in active operation.

OREGON MAPLE SUGAR.—Oregon has developed her manufacturing, agricultural, horticultural and other productive resources in a manner well worthy of patterning after by her northern neighbors, and the latest item of interest of this character from that region is the manufacture of maple sugar. This is a subject in which the people of Utah are interested, for even where the season might not be sufficiently long for the sugar cane to so develop so that its juice would properly granulate, the maple would grow, and yield a syrup that would afford excellent sugar. Here is what the Oregon Herald says:—

"It is an accomplished fact that maple sugar can be manufactured from the sap of the common white maple, which grows so profusely throughout Oregon. The experiment has heretofore been tried, but lacked success. During the month of February, the weather so closely resembled the 'sugar season' in the States, that E. R. Poppleton, at Scappoose Mills, in Columbia county, determined to make the experiment. He tapped seven young trees six inches in diameter, which yielded about two gallons each of sap a day. The attempts to manufacture sugar and syrup were both entirely successful. The sugar is very sweet; we have a sample of it, and it is really beautiful. It is just as clear if not clearer than that manufactured 'way back yonder.' We were informed that the syrup was of a beautiful color, and exceeded in appearance strained honey."
