PRESIDENT JEFFERY COMING

Traffic Manager S. H. Babcock Brings Word from Denver on His Return.

Traffic Manager S. H. Babcock of the Rio Grande Western has returned from a trip to Denver, where he has been for the major portion of the past week in consultation with General Manager D. C. Dodge prior to the resignation of the latter from the Rio Grande Western on June 30.

When seen this morning Mr. Babcock stated that beyond what had already been given out regarding the personnel of the directorate and executive heads of the Rio Grande Western that there would be nothing further known as to what would be done in regard to any contemplated changes, if any, at the general offices of the road here. All the rumors which are now floating in the allroad atmosphere in Salt Lake and Denver, he said, were without foundaion and nothing would be given out until after the inspection of the Western by President Jeffery, who will arrive with Vice President Dodge in this city on June 20. Upon the arrival of the new head of the Western here President Jeffery would go thoroughly into the details, inspect the road and lock into thing generally after which lock into things generally, after which he would formally take over the reins

of government. It goes without saying that when President Jeffery does arrive here he will find the Western in a very flourishing condition, both physically and financially, and a mere superficial examination on his part will demon-strate that he will have jurisdiction over a splendid piece of railroad from all standpoints.
