THE TARIFF BILL.

Preparations for Carrying Out its Provisions.

OF INTEREST TO THE WOOL TRADE.

The Status of Congress to Be Considered in All Probable Instances.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.—This tariff bill, which has been in the custody of the treasury department, was returned to the White House this morning. It is stated authoritatively that it is out of the question.

The bill becomes law at 10 o'clock tonight. Secretary Carlisle will this night issue instructions to the collectors of customs throughout the country, directing them to carry out the provisions of the new act. Secretary Carlisle has decided and will instruct the custom collectors that goods placed in bonded warehouses under the McMillan law and made free of duty under the new tariff are not subject to the same restrictions as those imposed and re-imposed, in order to get the benefits of the new act. This is of special interest to the wool trade, whose amount of wool is now in bonded warehouses. In this case, the secretary will allow the intent of Congress to be carried out by the aggrieved parties appeal to the courts, if they care to contest on constitutional grounds. He undoubtedly will take advantage of the opportunity to do so, as far as the technical point. WANTED IN SAN FRANCISCO

Summits as to One of the Bandits Captured in Chicago.

Operations of Henry Francis Gordon on the Pacific Coast—Story of a Desecrated Wife.

CAUSED A DEATH.

Consequences of the Burning of a Water Main.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—One of the two desperados captured by the Chicago police Saturday, after a six-hour chase, is "deadly" according to the local authorities. At least Captain Less thinks he is the same man who escaped from this city last February, after robbing members of the University of California of \$10,000 in gold jewelry. The description of Gordon given in the original tales of the man who when the San Fran police have been hunting for six months. The bandit names are also the same and there is no doubt that he is the same man. A certainty is the assumption that the man now in the Chicago prison is the man who was operated first and was captured last.

On February 16th last, Henry Francis Gordon was captured in San Francisco in the University club on Market street. He was a man apparently about thirty years old, slim built and about five feet six inches in height. He spoke with an English accent, and was a member of the British Benevolent society, and also said to be a member of the Young Men's Christian association. He worked but a few days and then disappeared, taking with him \$10,000 in gold jewelry, a watch of rings, chains, bracelets and other valuables which he had taken from the rooms of the gentlemen who gave it to him.

The matter was reported to the police, but nothing was done. It was ascertained that the English Benevolent society knew little or nothing of the man and also that he had no connection with the police, though the Young Men's Christian association was well known.

The water main was broken at the Farwell house. After being detected his wife worked her way back to this city. Last January Gordon returned to San Francisco unexpectedly and met his wife. They effected a reconciliation and began living together again.

By some unknown means he was able to get the endorsement of the English Benevolent society and was thus enabled to secure a position in the office of a jeweler in San Francisco. After being a failure for a few days he sold his goods and started his wife working for him again. The water main was broken at the Farwell house. THE HENKIN CANAL.

The East End Ready for the Contractors.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 27.—The east end of the Henkin canal is now ready for the contractors. The trees and shrubs have been removed from the first five miles of the right of way and the bid for the excavations and haulage of earth and stone in a few days will be awarded, with previous notice to be commenced within ten days. The government forces of 1,000 men have now passed up to the two hundred-foot mark, and inside of four weeks the canal will be ready for operation.

THE MYSTERIOUS MURDER.

DETROIT, Aug. 27.—Arthur J. Coker, attorney, has advertised in a series of papers of St. Louis for the return of a child of identity that is believed to have been stolen. Much of his wife's time has been spent in efforts to locate the child in this city for three years. There were a series of various articles of jewelry with several thousands of dollars.
