The revenue the city at present derives from the bill posting company-a San Francisco firm by the way now having bought out the local institution-is only \$25 a year and Mr. Hewlett states that if the proposed ordinance is adopted it will bring in from \$700 to \$800 a year besides checking the extension of the bill boards to resi-

dence quarters. The full ordinance is as follows: AN ORDINANCE.

An ordinance regulating and licens

ing billboards. Be it enacted by the city council of

Salt Lake City, Utah: Section 1. It shall be unlawful to creet, construct or maintain within the corporate limits of Salt Lake City any sign or billboard or other structure used or intended to be used for adversuch sign or hillboard or structure in existence at the time of the approval of this ordinance without first obtaining a permit so to do from the buildinspector

2. No such sign or billboard or other structure shall be erected, constructed or maintained at a greate height than ten (10) feet, measured from the grade of the lot, whereon the same is erected, constructed or main-tained; and shall not be located nearer an ten (10) feet from the inside line of any sidewalk.

3. Except on West Temple, Main and State streets between South Temple and Fourth South streets, and on South Temple, First South, Second South, Third South and Fourth South streets between West Temple and State streets, no such sign or bill board or other structure shall be erected, constructed or maintained without the consent in writing of two-thirds (2-3) householders (and householders are defined to mean the heads of fami-lies) residing on both sides of the street upon which it is proposed to

Any person, firm or corpo ration who erect or maintain any bill board or bill boards or other structures as described in this ordinance, shall at their own expense keep the ground on either side of said (bill board or bill boards clean and free from waste, filth and accumulation of any kind or nature whatsoever, and shall keep the same in good, heaithy, clean and sani-tary condition, and any failure to comply with this section shall be punished as hereinafter provided.

Section 9. This ordinance shall not be deemed to affect signs painted on buildings, or used by the occupants or own-

ers of any premises to advertise the business of such occupants or owners. Section 10. The owner or person hav ing control of any billboard for which a permit has been issued as in this or-dinance provided shall keep conspicu-ously to the top of such billboard, and so that the same can be read from the front of mob billboard a sign approxifront of such billboard, a sign approxi-mately four inches in width and two feet in length upon which is printed in dark letters upon a light ground, the number of such bill board as shown by

such permit. Section 11. Any person or persons, firm or corporation who either as principal, agent. clerk, employe or servant, violates, disobeys, omits, neglects or refuses to comply with the provisions of this ordinance is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not less than five (\$5.00) dollars and not exceeding one hundred (\$100.00) dollars, and every omission, neglect, violation or continu ance of the thing commanded or pro hibited by this ordinance, for each day after notice by any city officer, shall





Sec. 4. The permit mentioned in sec-tion 1 shall be issued by the building inspector in accordance with the pro-visions of this ordinance, and shall authorize the erection and maintenance of the billboard therein described for one year, provided the license mentioned section 7 shall have been paid. The permit shall show the date of issu-ance and the size and location of the billboard authorized to be erected and maintained, and the number of such biliboard

Sec. 5. The building inspector shall keep a record of all billboard permits and shall number all bill boards in the order in which the permits for the erection of the same are issued.

Section 6, All existing signs and bill boards and other structures used or intended to be used for advertising pur poses, which do not conform to the provisions of this ordinance shall be moved or so changed and altered as to conform therewith, within sixty (60 days after the approval of this ordinance. If the owner or person having control of such sign or bill board or other structure not in conformity with the provisions of this ordinance shall fall to remove or alter the same as in this section provided, shall be punished as hereinafter provided; and such sign or bill board shall be torn down by the building inspector.

Section 7. Upon the issuance of a permit herein mentioned the person, firm, company or corporation receiving such permit shall pay to the city treasurer a license fee of five (5) cents per linear or running foot of the bill board menloned in such permit, and such permit


