Threatened Water Famine - School Will Open Sept. 10.

Special Correspondence.

Eureka, Juab Co., Sept. 6.-It seems that the people of this place are again to be confronted by that formidable question which has, during the past year, caused so much trouble and discomfort—the water question. The city administration has had no end of troubie trying to operate a water system whereby the people of the camp could receive sufficient water for culinary purposes, but it now appears that they have been unsuccessful, and unless the Homansville Water Company (who own the plant) come to the rescue it is more than probable that on October 1st the water system which has been furnishing this city water for so many years. ing this city water for so many years, will be closed down indefinitely. This conclusion was arrived at at the last meeting of the city council and the di-rect causes of such a move arc, that for the past three months the city has been unable to furnish sufficient water for their pairons, who in turn, refuse to pay for such poor service, and thus the city has been handling the water sys-tem at a considerable loss to the tax-payers. Unless something can be done between this time and the 1st of next month the plant will be closed and the people of Eureka will have to rustle water as best they can. It may be that the Homansville Water Company will
