

## JORDAN IRRIGATION COMPANY.

The annual meeting of this company was held in the 17th Ward School-House on the 22nd ult.--Director A. H. Raleigh in the chair. Mr. Campbell, Secretary, read the annual financial exhibit, from which it appeared that \$10,960.40 had been expended in the construction of the dam and taking care of it till date; also that \$3,772.60 had been expended in the construction of canals.

An estimate was read of indebtedness of persons owning claims in the respective surveys, after their accounts were charged with \$5 per acre as water tax, which amounted to \$5,582.11.

It was voted unanimously that any parties owning claims in the original surveys, on which they do not wish to pay water tax, be relieved from said tax; provided they shall relinquish their claims to said land in favor of the company by the first of April next.

It was also voted unanimously that those persons who bought claims in the Pulsipher field, April 27, 1859, be only charged with \$2 per acre as water tax; provided the amount paid on said claims was not less than \$3 per acre, and that said persons have stock issued to them to the amount they have paid for the same and for the canal.

The meeting adjourned sine die.

**DEEP SNOWS.**—The snow on the Wasatch range of mountains, is reported to be very deep. In the canyons east of this Valley, where parties have been getting out wood during the winter, it is from five to seven feet deep on the level, and deeper in places where it has been drifted. Several slides have occurred, but so far as reported, no lives have been lost, and no particular damage has been done. How deep the snow may be on the tops of the "High hills" is not known, but from appearances it is piled up there in profuse abundance. There has not been so much snow in the valley in this and in the northern counties during the winter at any one time, as in former years, but in some of the middle counties it is said to have fallen in large quantities, and very recently was unusually deep in many places.
