Benefit Auction Sale.—At six o'clock this evening, Barratt Bros. will sell at auction, for the benefit of St. Mary's and St. Mark's Hospitals, a quantity of furniture, carpets, etc., donated by the late Salt Lake Chess Club. The sale will take place in the premises of Mayors F. Little, next door west to the Deseret National Bank Building, the use of the room being given free for the purpose.

Great Slaughter.—Six Salt Lake residents challenged nine residents of Kayville to shoot rabbits on the Sand Ridge, north of that place. The Kayville nine were the winners, killing 201, the Salt Lakeers getting 265. Another party from Salt Lake killed, in the same vicinity, 395, making a total of 931. There were a few other parties shooting in the locality, which would make the number slaughtered somewhere between 1,000 and 1,500.

The little animals have been so thick there that they have done considerable injury to crops.

Brutal Outrage.—Yesterday, a little girl, twelve years old, Elizabeth M. Barrett, was returning home from St. Mary's school, when a man approached her, gagged her, at the same time putting some drug in her mouth that she states tasted bad. He put her in a covered wagon, drove out of town, violated her person and left her, telling her if she ever told what had happened he would cut her throat.

In the evening she was found on the State Road, near Howard's school, by Mr. Joseph J. Taylor, who brought her to town and took her to the residence of her parents. The girl states that from the time she was gagged she was seized with a peculiar, drowsy feeling.

No trace has yet been found of the brutal villain. It is to be hoped he will be discovered and punished as he deserves.

The girl is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Barrett. Her father is a cook and is now in Tuscarora.

The Indian Farmers.—Our readers will remember that a shameful and malicious attempt was made by the grand jury of the Third District Court, for the April term, to create a public prejudice against a handful of Indians who, forsaking their nomadic life, are cultivating the ground and taking on the habits of civilization. The report of the jury on the subject, dated Sep. 29th, 1877, was one of the most malignant and wicked yet weak documents ever framed. Its aim, which was apparent in every paragraph, was to instigate a feeling that would prompt the adoption of measures to have those helpless Indians driven a second time from their farms. There being no truth to sustain the innuendoes and direct charges and statements of the jury report, it had to be bolstered and propped with lies and misrepresentations. The objects of this malice were asserted to belong to the Fort Hall reservation, and they were represented as never having severed their tribal relations, which showing was utterly untrue. It appears that these falsifications were carried to the head of the Indian Department at Washington, who instructed the agents in this region to investigate and report whether or not the farmer Indians belonged to the reservations.

Mr. Danielson, United States Indian Agent at Fort Hall, Idaho, who has given several evidences of prejudice against the Mormons, has complied with the instructions from the department at Washington.

To the person to whom he addressed the following note, he wrote of the missionaries of the Church, who is engaged in the laudable and philanthropic work of teaching the Indians, located in the Snake country, to forsake their idle habits and become good and respectable citizens. This communication, being official and entirely reliable, knocks the props from under the malignant grand jury report:

"BEAR RIVER CAMP, Utah, Nov. 16th, 1877.

"Mr. Danielson: I have visited your camp for the purpose of seeing the Indians and finding out for myself how many of them, if any, belong to the Fort Hall Indian Agency. I have seen the Indians here, but have not found any belonging to the agency above named.

"Very respectfully, "W. H. DANIELSON, U. S. Indian Agent."

CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 1.—Wadleigh presented a resolution declaring Eustis entitled to his seat in the Senate from Louisiana; placed on the calendar.

Ingalls gave notice that he did not concur with the majority of the committee on the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in their report, and would hereafter present the report of the minority, signed by himself and two others.

The deficiency appropriation bill was then taken up.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 1.—The resolution of Baker, of Ind., instructing the committee on Patents to report a bill which shall prohibit the bringing or maintaining of suits for damages of any infringement of patent against any person who purchases, for his own use and not for sale or barter, any article or implement in market, unless, at the time he purchases it, he knew he was infringing some existing patent, was adopted—yeas 118, nays 43.

On motion of Wood a resolution was adopted for the final adjournment of Congress at 5 p.m. to-day.

In the 14th Ward of this City, Dec. 1st, of brain fever, JOSEPH E. son of Benjamin and Adelaide Hampton, aged two months. Funeral services at 11 a.m. to-morrow, at residence of parents. Friends of the family are invited.

At the residence of Miss Joseph S. Tanner, in Panguitch, U. T., on the 28th day of Nov., 1877, POLLY COOK, aged 25 years, 1 month, and 7 days.

Decided was born in Warren County, State of New York, on May 19th, 1852, and was a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints in the year 1882. She was united in marriage to Edward Cook, in 1874, and started with him to join the settlement of the Saints in San Bernardino, California, in 1882. Mr. Cook died on the journey, but deceased reached her destination in safety. In one of the memorable years of the Buchanan war, viz., 1862, she came to this Territory, with the rest of the California Saints, and here since that date resided constantly with the family of John Tanner, in Panguitch. She was modest and retiring in disposition; was a superior, whole-hearted Latter-day Saint; had recently removed her garments with the aid of the waters of baptism, and died with full faith in the promises of a glorious resurrection.—(Con.)
