The moneys hereby appropriated for building and improvements of the Agricultural College at Logan, to wit, the sum of \$65,000, shall be expended by and under the direction of a board of construction, consisting of George W. Thatcher, Isaac D. Haines and William Goodwin, who shall each receive for their services	375 00

the sum of \$300, to be paid upon the completion of the building; said board of construction shall each give bond in the sum of \$25,000, to be approved by the Territorial auditor, and quality by taking the official oath before entering upon their duties; such board shall elect a chairman, and warrants for the money appropriated for said building shall be drawn by the auditor of public accounts upon the order of such chairman.

So much of section 1345, Compiled Laws of Utah, 1888, as appropriates \$10,000 per annum to the Normal school, is hereby repealed.

All claims and bills for money appropriated herein for the relief of any and all persons shall be filed with the auditor of public accounts before warrants shall be drawn for same.

The following balances upon the books of the Territorial auditor to the credit of the following funds, on December 31, 1891, are hereby cancelled, to wit:

And the Territorial auditor is hereby required to balance the same.

That out of the first moneys in the Territorial treasury, not otherwise appropriated from revenue or from sale of bonds, shall first be paid the amounts appropriated herein for the payment of deficits reported by the various commissioners and directors of public institutions.

Payments of salaries or other expenses included in this bill shall not be duplicated, if it shall appear that they are covered by appropriations made heretofore by special laws.

The clerk of the supreme court is hereby made ex-officio the Territorial librarian, and there is hereby appropriated the sum of \$1,000 for the years 1892 and 1893, to be drawn quarterly.
