Egyptian Rice.—A fine specimen Real Estate in Salt Lake City, of Egyptian rice has been presented to the Museum by Mr. J. A. Van Machinery at Shoe Factory Natta of this city. It was raised by him from seed sent from the eastern States. Although in Egypt this variety of rice may be raised without water, it appears that this cannot be done here.
