Promoter Pittsburgh Re-elected City School Superintendent.

SITE PROPOSITIONS MADE.

A New Building for the First Ward. Applications to Teach—Music—Business.

The Board of Education met last night. Vice-President Nelson presiding. The members in attendance were: Mears, All, Young, Raymond, Pike, Baldwin and Dwyer.

SEATS PURCHASED.

The committee on site and buildings reported recommending the purchase of 500 rods of ground adjoining the Bayard school grounds on First Street, on the east, at \$100 per rod, foot, also 50 rods of back land for \$1,400, or the total sum of \$4,200. The use of part of the lot had been obtained for the purpose of driving wagons containing building material, said. Adopted.

HANDBALL SCHOOL.

The same committee also reported the following bids for the new site of the Hanball school in the First Ward: C. H. Brown, \$1,000; John W. Farnsworth and Son, \$1,000; George H. Jones, \$1,000.

The committee recommended that the bid of Cramford Bros. & Bryan be accepted, provided they execute a bond for \$10,000, and that they agree to finance the building by October 1, 1892. Adopted, and the committee ordered to execute the contract.

SITE PROPOSITION.

Hodge Brothers offered the sum of \$1,100, block 25, plat 1, 10x19 rods, on the corner of Eleventh East and First South streets, for \$4,000. Referred to committee on sites and buildings.

WATERFRONT.

The committee on sites and buildings reported the execution of a contract between the Salt Lake Building and Manufacturing company and the board for the erection of the Twentieth school; also the execution of a contract between the board and Wm. H. Jay for the erection of the addition to the Bayard school house.

SALARY INCREASE.

The committee on salaries and buildings reported an increase in the salary to the salary of the assistant superintendent from \$1,000 to \$1,200. Adopted.
