## CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, 4.—The following bills were introduced:

By Hartwell, of Illinois, to sub-

stitute greenbacks for the issue of

the national banking association,

to pay the full amount for all the

bonds deposited by them in the

treasury, in accordance with the

terms of the contract expressed on

the face of said bonds, the bonds so

redeemed to be cancelled.

By Schlicher, for the construction

of a railroad from San Antonio

to Eagle Pass, Texas; also to

ascertain the losses sustained by

citizens of Texas by reason of Mex-

ican depredations.

By Lutzell, for the relief of cer-

tain soldiers in the State of Califor-

nia; also to correct the boundaries

of certain lands in California.

Tucker, on the committee on

ways and means, reported back a

bill for the relief of the estate of

John W. Tucker, deceased, who

was killed by the explosion of a

mine at the mouth of the Colorado

river, in the State of Colorado.

By Frye, on the judiciary commit-

tee, reported back the bill prescrib-

ing a oath of office which elimi-

nates from the statutes the law

which prescribes the taking of the

test iron-clad oath, passed.

Also a bill repealing section 520 of

the Revised Statutes, which pro-

vides for the disqualification of any

juror who has, without duress or

coercion, taken up arms in defense

of any institution or rebellion

against the United States, or who

has given aid or comfort thereto;

also presented their printed argu-

ments, and the court took the mat-

ter under advisement. E. A. Storm

appeared for government, and

Messrs. Lawrence & Campbell for

him.
