AERIAL DEFENSE OF UNITED STATES

Gen. Allen, Chief of Signal Corps Of Army, Announces Plan of What is Necessary.

WANTS PERMANENT STATIONS

Zeppelin Balloon Performances Have Convinced War Department Era of Air Navigation Has Arrived.

Washington, June 2 .- Under the instructions of Brig.-Gen. Allen, chief of the signal corps of the army, plans have been prepared, it was announced tonight, showing what is necessary for the aerial defense of the United States, If Congress would appropriate the money he would begin with three points along the Atlantic coast-Washington, New York and Philadelphia-where dirigible balloons and aeroplanes would be stationed. At each point one large balloon and possibly one aeroplane would be placed. This would require more than \$500,000. Gen. Alen has had prepared a map

showing points along the other borders of the country and in the interior where he believes there should be aerial dehe believes there should be aerial de-fenses. To carry out the entire scheme would require about \$5,000,000.

The war department is convinced in the light of achievement of the Zeppe-lin balloon, that the era of aerial navi-gation has arrived. It hopes that Con-gress will also awake to a realization of the fact and that appropriations will be made sufficient to permit this gov-arrivent to keep page with the Eurobe made sufficient to permit this government to keep pace with the European nations. In anticipation of favorable action by Congress, the signal corps has been instructed to prepare the plans referred to.

"It is intended," said, an army officer tonight, "that the coast dirigible shall not pass off its own station except in cases of extremity and that the saling distance shall be 125 miles south and 125 miles north from its depot. In

ing distance shall be 125 miles south and 125 miles north from its depot.In this manner the entire coast from Maine to Fiorida will be patrolled and in case of war it will be practically impossible for a hostile fleet to approach the United States without being discovered long before the southeless of discovered long before the sentinels on land could see the vessels. Once discovered the fleet's movement could be watched with safety and by the use of wireless its maneuvers be sent the

length of the coast.
"The plans will include an elaborate system of vertical search lights by which the airships would be guided durwhich the airships would be guided during night flights. These lights will mark the various batteries and the balloon and depots and they also will be used in signaling the swiftly flying ships overhead. Most of the signaling, however, will probably be done through means of wireless. Experiments have demonstrated that messages can be received in a balloon car with complete safety although there is a question safety although there is a question whether messages can be sent to earth from the car without exploding the free gas that surrounds the balloon envelope."

TAFT'S TRIBUTE TO EMPEROR OF JAPAN

He is a Wonderful Man, Said President at Reception to Vice Admiral Baron Uriu.

QUIET RAP AT THE SENATE

Humorously Referred to it as Being Only Place Now of Interest-But Anxious to Make Others So.

Washington, June 2 .- Japan's emperor is a wonderful man, according to President Taft's address here tonight at a reception at the Metropolitan club in honor of Vice Admiral Baron

President Taft expressed his great pleasure at being present and said he had come to testify to the warm personal friendship he felt for the emperor and the people of Japan. That feeling of personal friendship, he said, conformed to his official attitude as president of the United States.

The president said it had been his good fortune to know those responsible for the government of Japan more intimately than those in charge of any other government except his own. He spoke of his four visits to Japan and said the wonderful qualities of the cmsaid the wonderful qualities of the emperor of that great country as a ruler are shown in his making such marvelous selections as he has of the men who carry on the great work which that empire has done in the last 30 years,
"I think," the president said, "the

truth is that I wore out my welcome in Japan. I was overwhelmed with hospitality every time I went there and no expression on my part and no act of hospitality could be equal to or satisfy the debt I feel for the cordial reception that on those four visits I received from the emperor and his officers, civil and military and the people of Japan.

ROOSEVELT'S NAME. "It happened that in 1905, we visited the country at a pyschological moment when Mr. Roosevelt's name was in the mouths of every one of the Japanese people as interesting himself in bringing about an end to the great war, and I venture to say that no person except a Japanese public man himself ever received a greater popular welcome than the party of which I was

"I found that the great men I had met before had been promoted. They began in my first visit as barons and ended in my last as princes, which only illustrates the work which had my first visit in 1900, and my last visit in 1907."

The president tendered to Admiral Urlu his sincerest congratulations on the high position be had attained in the Japanese navy and thanked him that in doing so he had reflected credit on the United States naval academy. QUIET RAP AT THE SENATE.

"There is no place of interest now," added the president, "except the senate chamber and we are anxious to make other places interesting. (Laughter.) The heat tonight is something we ought not to pass over without comment. If it continues it may serve its uses and I hope if Admiral Uriu is exposed and feels somewhat inconvenienced by it, he should know it is to be a necessary element in working out with us con-stitutional government.

"And now, I wish to propose a toast from my heart, because it is to a gracious gentleman to whose kindly and munificient hospitality on three or four occasions I have owed much and to whose ability, to whose patriotism and to whose greatness as a monarch in developing Japan which he has become the world as one of its developing Japan which he has brought before the world as one of its great empires, all will pay tribute— I propose a toast to his imperial majesty, the emperor of Japan—Banzl." William H. Stoyton, a member of the Annapolis class of '81 extended a welcome to Admiral Urlu to which the latter feelingly responded.
