

AERIAL DEFENSE OF UNITED STATES

Gen. Allen, Chief of Signal Corps Of Army, Announces Plan of What is Necessary.

WANTS PERMANENT STATIONS

Zeppelin Balloon Performances Have Convinced War Department Era of Air Navigation Has Arrived.

Washington, June 2.—Under the instructions of Brig.-Gen. Allen, chief of the signal corps of the army, plans have been prepared, it was announced tonight, showing what is necessary for the aerial defense of the United States.

If Congress would appropriate the money he would begin with three points along the Atlantic coast—Washington, New York and Philadelphia—where dirigible balloons and aeroplanes would be stationed. At each point one large balloon and possibly one aeroplane would be placed. This would require more than \$500,000.

Gen. Allen has prepared a map showing points along the other borders of the country and in the interior where he believes there should be aerial defenses. To carry out the entire scheme would require about \$5,000,000.

The war department is convinced in the light of achievement of the Zeppelin balloon, that the era of aerial navigation has arrived. It hopes that Congress will also awake to a realization of the fact and that appropriations will be made sufficient to permit this government to keep pace with the European nations. In anticipation of favorable action by Congress, the signal corps has been instructed to prepare the plans referred to.

"It is intended," said an army officer tonight, "that the coast dirigible shall not pass off its own station except in cases of emergency and that the sailing distance shall be 125 miles south and 125 miles north from its depot. In this manner the entire coast from Maine to Florida will be patrolled and in case of war could be practically impossible for a hostile fleet to approach the United States without being discovered long before the sentinels on land could see the vessel. Once discovered the fleet's movement could be watched with safety and by the use of wireless its maneuvers be sent the length of the coast."

The plans will include an elaborate system of vertical search lights by which the airships would be guided during night flights. These lights will mark the various batteries and the balloon and aeroplanes and also will be used in signaling the swiftly flying ships overhead. Most of the signaling, however, will probably be done through means of wireless. Experiments have demonstrated that messages can be received in a balloon car with complete safety although there is a question whether messages can be sent to earth from the car without the aid of the free gas that surrounds the balloon envelope."

A TRUE FRIEND.

Twice a Year Philip Corbin, for 45 Years, Has Visited Murderer.

Waterbury, Conn., June 2.—Philip Corbin of New Britain, president of a hardware company and one of the wealthiest citizens of the state, has returned from the state prison in Wethersfield, where he visited his old chum, Charles Gilbert, a convict sentenced in 1884, for murder. Mr. Corbin makes such trips twice a year. Years ago, when both men were young, with their way to make in the world, they were members of the New Britain cricket team. Corbin was the star bowler and Gilbert was a terror at the bat. They were big factors in making New Britain win a great majority of its games. One day Gilbert, in a fit of rage, shot and killed Henry Caldwell. Corbin stood by his friend through the trial, but the evidence was conclusive and Gilbert was regarded as lucky to escape the gallows. "You are guilty,"

TAFI'S TRIBUTE TO EMPEROR OF JAPAN

He is a Wonderful Man. Said President at Reception to Vice Admiral Baron Uriu.

QUIET RAP AT THE SENATE

Humorously Referred to it as Being Only Place Now of Interest—But Anxious to Make Others So.

Washington, June 2.—Japan's emperor is a wonderful man, according to President Taft's address here tonight at a reception at the Metropolitan club in honor of Vice Admiral Baron Uriu.

President Taft expressed his great pleasure at being present and said he had come to testify to the warm personal friendship he felt for the emperor and the people of Japan. That feeling of personal friendship, he said, conformed to his official attitude as president of the United States.

The president said it had been his good fortune to know those responsible for the government of Japan more intimately than those of any other government except his own. He spoke of his four visits to Japan and said the wonderful qualities of the emperor of that country as a ruler are shown in his making such marvelous selections as he has of the men who carry on the great work which that empire has done in the last 30 years.

"I think," the president said, "the truth is that I wore out my welcome in Japan. I was overwhelmed with hospitality and kindness. I have had no expression on my part and no act of hospitality could be equal to or satisfy the debt I feel for the cordial reception that I have received here. I received from the emperor and his officers, civil and military and the people of Japan."

"It happened that in 1905, we visited the country at a psychological moment when Mr. Roosevelt's name was in the mouths of every one of the Japanese people as interesting himself in bringing about an end to the great war, and I found that something was being done in the short time between my first visit in 1890, and my last visit in 1907."

The president tendered to Admiral Uriu his sincerest congratulations on the high position he had attained in the Japanese navy and thanked him for doing so. He had reflected credit on the United States naval academy. "There is no place of interest now," added the president, "except the senate chamber and we are anxious to make other places interesting. (Laughter.) The best tonight is something we ought not to pass over without comment. If it continues it may serve its uses and I hope if Admiral Uriu is exposed and feels somewhat inconvenienced by it, he should know it is to be a necessary element in working out with us constitutional government."

"And now," said the president, "I propose a toast to the great man, the great gentleman to whose kindly and munificent hospitality on three or four occasions I have owed much and to whose ability, to whose patriotism and to whose greatness as a monarch in developing Japan which has brought before the world as one of its great empires, all we may truly propose a toast to his imperial majesty, the emperor of Japan—Banzai."

William H. Stoyton, a member of the Annapolis class of '81 extended a welcome to Admiral Uriu to which the latter feelingly responded. He recalled the words of President Garfield when the members must always have before them the motto of, "Work, work," before they could hope to accomplish anything.

Speaker Cannon expressed no fear of war between the United States and Japan. "There would be friction," he said, "but the differences would be settled because the interests of the two nations are mutual and demagogues in either country would not dominate the people."

LEWISTON NATIONAL BANK INVESTIGATION

Lewistown, Ind., June 2.—United States Atty. Linderfelder has been ordered to depart from Boise to represent the department of justice in the cases arising out of the alleged defalcation in the Lewiston National bank case, and the attorney-general in Washington has been apprised of the situation here.

The matter was turned over to the department of justice yesterday by National Bank Examiner Claude Gatch, who remains in the city to receive instructions.

The amount of the alleged defalcations approximates \$137,000.

BIG SNOWSLIDE IN IDAHO.

Boise, Ida., June 2.—A special to the Statesman from Roosevelt, Thurston Mountain, May 31, via Smiths Ferry, June 2, says:

A landslide three miles in length and 200 feet wide and that piled up along Mule creek to a depth of 100 feet, occurred here today. The creek was forced out of the bed, the back waters flooding Roosevelt until, as this world is sent, most of the buildings in the town are floating.

The placer property of Caswell & Curran is destroyed, the giant and pipe being buried. No lives were lost and no one was injured so far as known. Everything is in a chaotic condition.
