### PRIESTHOOD CONFERENCE.

Bishops, Priests, Teachers and Deacons of Utah Stake Hold Interesting Meetings.

Utah Lake Association Calls Important Meeting-Sequel of Notorious Case-News Briefs.

Special Correspondence. Provo, Utah Co., March 23.-The stake conference of the Lesser Priesthood was held here yesterday. Farrell of Smithfield, Cach dentific and practical study of dr farming for the past 40 years, and each year produces a volume of wheat the might arouse the deepent interest of the princet of the product o armer of this region and has learned cometimes by sad experience but alvays with undaunted determination, he lesson of how to raise large crops grain without water. erning his farming methods.
Mr. Farrell was recently asked t leveribe his mode of procedure in wheat culture, and made the following state-

ment on this important subject:
The time is fast approaching when
we should commence breaking up new and by plowing it not less than six inches deep but if plowed eight inches loep all the better. After plowing she your harrow and run lengthwise. ken follow with a disc harrow in the over crosowise, lapping corrow half way and continue to har-cw every 10 or 12 days till about Aug 5, then take a leveller 14 or 16 feet ong and level it down nicely, then ake a good press drill and after leaning and vitriolizing your good fall wheat with one pound of vitriol to six o pounds to the acre. It possible, get it your drilling finished by Sept. 15 or o as this will enable the grain to get well rooted before frost comes.

Those having summer fallowing to should commence as early as the cund is fit to plow, and run the plow wn not less than eight inches, then follow with a good subsoil piew and run it down six inches more harrow cross-vise, and continue to harrow the opposite way every 10 or 12 days until Aug. 15, then level and sow as above Special Correspondence.

My advice would be to range every third crop by sowing on bushel of barley per acre upon the land in the spring and by plowing the ground in the fall and letting it lie through the winter, then disc and harv it good and sow as early in spring the weather will permit, unless you get fail barley, in which case v as early as possible in September.
